REFORM OF THE LORDS

This Question Divides All Others Before the British Electorate.

SALISBURY SKIRKED THE ISSUE
His Residence on the Subject Causes Uneasiness in the House of Commons.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Lord Salisbury's plan for the reform of the House of Lords, while admitting that a reconstruction of that body is desirable, is the theme of general regret on the part of the Conservative press. The explanation of this is that his address being made only forty-eight hours after that of Lord Rosebery, he did not have time to consult with his colleagues as to an alternative programme. Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, Premier of the Conservative Government, was expected to address the House of Commons on November 12, if his health will permit. The probability of his doing so is not certain, but he is expected to give some idea of the Government's policy with regard to the House of Lords.

Among the Conservatives several propositions are being debated, including one for the appointment of a selection committee of the House of Lords to consider what changes can be made that would promote the efficiency of the Upper House. The appointment of such a committee was proposed by Lord Rosebery in 1888, but it was at the time rejected. In the present crisis of the Government, the Conservative party is expected to support the proposal.

The Liberal Unionists several propositions are being debated, including one for the appointment of a selection committee of the House of Lords to consider what changes can be made that would promote the efficiency of the Upper House. The appointment of such a committee was proposed by Lord Rosebery in 1888, but it was at the time rejected. When the Government was defeated in 1870 over Lord Rosebery's proposal, it was understood that the Government would not attempt to reform the House of Lords. The Government has now decided to do so, and the Liberal Unionist party is expected to support the proposal.

The Important Events in a Few Words

Kingston's election of Sir John Macdonald will be cast Nov. 30.

Seventy-two typhoid cases were reported in Winnipeg in October.
The funds in the United States Treasury for October is \$14,000,000.

Hamilton St. Andrew's Society has just held its 25th anniversary.
The coal dealers of London, Ont., have put up the price from \$5.80 to \$6.

Angus McDonald, a convict, escaped from Kingston penitentiary on Friday.
William McTaggart, a notorious opium smuggler, has been captured in Detroit.

Rev. William Land, a superannuated Methodist preacher, died in Woodstock on Tuesday.
The Pope has decided to refuse Emile Zola, the French author, an audience under any considerations.

The Commercial Life Insurance Company of New York, has been placed in the hands of a receiver.
The President of the United States has proclaimed appointed Thursday, Nov. 20, Thanksgiving Day.

The Sultan Mine at Port Rait is said to have been bought by an English syndicate for over \$200,000.
Mr. J. B. Aylesworth of Newburg has been nominated for the Commons by the Patrons of Addington.

The district of Casablanca, Morocco, is said to be in a state of anarchy, and rival tribes are killing each other.
It is said the force now at work on the Culebra branch of the Panama Canal will soon be increased to 1,000 men.

The London Times announces the death of the Right Hon. Sir Patrick Joseph Keenan, at Glasnevin, Ireland.
Hon. Mr. Mercier's funeral took place on Friday and was one of the most imposing that Montreal has ever witnessed.

The North-west is having its first cold snap of this season. At Prince Albert on Friday there was 29 degrees of frost.
The C. P. R. station at Bolton was broken into on Tuesday night and the safe blown to pieces, but the robbers got nothing.

It is said that Toronto and Montreal engineers are planning to construct a line of railway from Quebec to the coast of Labrador.
The Medical Superintendent of Montreal General Hospital is going to try the anti-toxic remedy in the next diphtheria case that comes to the hospital.

Mullins & Wilson, Toronto cattle dealers, are, according to a Winnipeg dispatch, making large shipments of Northwest live stock to France.
Messrs. Wilson and Henderson, of Brantford, lately patented a new steam engine. They have sold the patent in the United States for \$17,000.

The three-class clerks and letter-carriers in the Victoria, B. C., postoffice are out on strike because of non-payment of their provisional allowance.
Postmaster Dolmage of Lacombe, Alberta, swallowed poison on Thursday morning that the department would discover a shortage in his accounts.

Jacob Bouchard, a mail carrier for the Saguenay district, fell off the pier at Bale St. Paul, Quebec, on Wednesday night, and was drowned.
Mr. John Mitchell, of Dorchester township, has just celebrated his 101st birthday anniversary. His faculties are undimmed, and he reads with great interest.

The remains of Mrs. J. Lint, who wandered away from her home in Kohler in May last, have been found in a shallow grave about a mile from the village.
While entering the American Hotel at Stoughton on Friday, Mr. Timothy Howe dropped dead. Cause of death, rheumatism of the heart. He was 84 years of age.

Li Hing Chang made an offer to Admiral Fremantle to buy three or four warships of the British squadron. He would not believe that the vessels were not for sale.
The W. C. T. U. convention at Cornwall on Thursday elected officers. Mrs. May R. Thornley of London being re-elected President. The convention closed during the day.

Holy Trinity church, Chatham, is now free of debt, the sum of \$3,838 having been sent to the Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Company to clear off a mortgage.

Mercuries Life Ended.
Quebec's Esteemed Former Statesman Passes Away.
MONTREAL, Oct. 3.—Honorable Mercur died yesterday morning at 8.45. The end had been expected any time during the preceding twenty-four hours, and hopes of recovery had been given up weeks ago. He died on the 14th day of August last. It had been felt that he lay on his death bed.

Honorable Mercur was born at St. Athanas, Quebec, on October 15, 1816. He was educated at the college of the Jesuit Fathers in Montreal; studied for the bar and was called to the bar in 1840.

He succeeded to the throne on the murder of his father by nihilist conspirators on March 18, 1881, was born March 10, 1845. For some time after his elevation to the throne he seldom appeared in public, but lived in the closest retirement in Gatchina, being in constant dread of the machinations of the secret societies of socialists. His coronation took place at Moscow, on May 27, 1881. He married, in 1881, Mary Feodorovna (formerly Mary Sophia Fedorovna) daughter of Christian IX., King of Denmark, and sister of the Princess of Wales and King of Greece.
