He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Warner Phelps of Delta and Mrs. George Churchill of Athens; two brothers, Elkins and Clinton of Elgin; two sisters, Mrs. Johnston of Singleton's and Mrs. Lashley of Toronto. To these in their great sorrow the Reporter joins with their many friends in extending heartfelt sympathy.

By request of the deceased, the Rev. L. A. Betts of Brockville, a life long friend of the family and under whose ministry he was converted several years ago, conducted an impressive funeral service in the Methodist church, preaching forcefully from the words found in John 7:17.

During the hour, Rev. Mr. Crossley sang very effectively, "Oh, what a change!" after which Rev. S. J. Hughes, pastor, and Rev. E. W. Crane read the burial service at the church, when the body was borne to Elgin, to rest near the scenes of his childhood.
