WARRANTY PURCHASERS

EVERY assignment of the right of a South
African Volunteer entitled to a land grant
must be by way of appointment of a substitute

thousand dollars, (\$10,000.00), must be
deposited as security. The cheque will
be returned in case of non-acceptance of
tender.
