

Giants of the Mighty Deep

Giants are, always interesting, whether they are human, animal or plant. And while in ages past the divisions of the animal kingdom boasted giants of far greater size than those of modern times, even nowadays gigantic creatures exist in numbers in the sea.

The greatest of these marine giants are the whales. And probably the largest of the whales, as well as the most gigantic of all living creatures, is the sulphur bottom. It attains a length of nearly or quite 100 feet and a weight of 150 tons.

One individual measured 95 feet in length, 39 feet in girth, with a jaw-bone 21 feet long; baleen (whalebone), 4 feet long; weight of baleen, 800 pounds; weight of entire whale 147 tons, and it yielded 110 barrels of oil.

The sulphur bottom seldom bolts, as the whales term the action of leaping diagonally from the sea, or breaches, as perpendicular springs are called, but when he does perform in this manner he presents a truly wonderful sight.

While whales are the largest of marine animals, yet certain fish grow to almost as gigantic size. The largest of true fishes are found among the sharks, says the American Boy, and the largest of these formidable fishes are the whale sharks. These huge fish occur in the waters of India, Japan, South America, Panama, California and the West Indies.

The nose is very broad and blunt and the mouth, although very wide, is armed only with very minute teeth. It is a dark colored creature marked with small, whitish spots and is perfectly harmless to man, feeding exclusively on small fish. Its huge bulk makes it dangerous when wounded. This great fish reaches a maximum length of 70 feet.

Probably the second largest shark is the basking shark, known also as elephant shark and bone shark. This species derives its name from its habit of collecting schools and basking in the sun at the surface of the sea. It reaches a length of 40 to 50 feet and while large is perfectly harmless.

Its teeth are small and numerous and its food consists of small fishes, shrimp, crustaceans, etc. It is ordinarily of a gentle and quiet disposition, but if wounded or injured can readily smash an ordinary boat to pieces with its powerful tail. It was formerly widely hunted for its oil but has become too scarce to hunt with much success.

The man eating sharks, which are so greatly dreaded by many people and are very common in tropical seas, grow to immense size, and with their ferocious character and powerful jaws and teeth, are probably the most formidable of ocean giants.

The great sleeper shark is a most stupid gluttonous species—as in fact are most of the sharks—and spends most of its time dozing on the surface of the sea. When aroused or hungry it attacks whales, porpoises or in fact anything it can find, and bites great pieces from its victims with its knife like teeth.

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imum length of about fifteen feet, and a weight of nearly a ton.

Almost as large as the tunnies are the few fishes, which are related to the sea bass, and which are commonly called bass or sea bass by the Californian fishermen. These fish occur throughout tropical American seas and grow to a weight of 500 to 600 pounds. Although a very large and powerful fish and capable of snapping a stout hemp rope or breaking the stoutest shark hook, yet these fish are caught, played and landed by fishermen in California by the aid of a slender rod of split bamboo and a tiny threadlike line.

A fish of a very different character and so striking in form that it will invariably attract attention is the giant sun fish or moon fish. Its shape is almost circular, and this, with its odd fins and lack of tail, gives it a most curious appearance. Its name of sun fish is derived from its habit of spending many hours basking in the sun on the ocean's surface. Its eyes are large, its mouth small, and taken altogether it is among the most grotesque of marine creatures, being apparently all head.

It is found practically all over the world, but it is particularly common on the southeastern coast of the United States and in California waters. It is frequently carried north in the Gulf stream and thus often taken off the New England coast. The sun fish is perfectly harmless and is so sluggish, stupid and so easily seen that it is readily approached and harpooned. This fish often attains a weight of from 200 to 500 pounds.

Almost as strange in appearance as the sunfish are the great devil fish, "vampire fishes," or "bat fishes," of our southern coasts and the neighboring tropical seas. These grotesque creatures grow to great size, frequently being from twenty to thirty feet across their huge "wings," and four feet in thickness. Such a giant would weigh fully six tons, and yet so agile and powerful are the great creatures that they leap fifteen to twenty feet out of water, looking while in the air like enormous bats.

Their "horas" are really extensions of the fins and are used like hands for holding food and other objects, and in bringing it to the mouth, which is on the under side and has no teeth in the upper jaw. The lower jaw has about a hundred rows of small cobblestone-like teeth. The fish is jet black above and livid white below and despite its size is very docile.

HARD SOAP WITHOUT BOILING.

In a stone jar or iron pot dissolve one can of lye with one quart of cold water, stirring with a stick. Allow solution, which will immediately become hot, to cool. Melt six pounds of grease, tallow or lard, clean and free from salt, and when entirely melted allow to cool sufficiently to bear your hand in it. When grease becomes of this temperature, and not before, stir in the cooled solution of lye until the mixture is thoroughly combined and drops from the stirrer the thickness of honey. Stir thoroughly but no longer than necessary. Pour into wooden box lined with muslin. Cover with blanket or carpet and set in a warm place for two or three days; empty out and cut to convenient shapes.

If soap is streaky it has not been stirred thoroughly. Cut small and reboil with one quart of water. Pour into box again and proceed as before. Eldora Lockwood Dow in Woman's World for January.

FACTS FOR THE CURIOUS.

Periodicals issued in raised letters for the blind are to be carried through the United States mails free.

According to the United States Geological Survey, 22,000 men have been killed in coal mines in the last 17 years, and nearly 50,000 have been seriously injured.

A penguin oil industry is to be established at Marquarie Island, about half way between Tasmania and the Antarctic continent. This island, twenty-five miles long and five wide, is estimated to contain probably eighty million penguins, so that the stock seems almost limitless.

Artificial milk, made from the soja bean is a testimony to the ingenuity of the Japanese, and it is said to correspond very closely with ordinary condensed milk. The beans are first soaked, then boiled in water. Presently the liquid turns white, sugar and phosphate of potash in proper quantities are added, and the boiling continues until a substance the thickness of molasses is obtained.—Argonaut.

The subject of canal tolls will not be down. The President was reluctant to sign the bill last summer by which coastwise vessels were free from tolls. And yet he was able to persuade himself on the whole that the argument in favor of such tolls was sound, but every day brings fresh protest against it.

It is impossible to put the law beside the treaty and not see that the latter document contravenes the former. It ought not to be a difficult thing to decide what to do in such a case.

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THE BEST WAY.

A Handful of Useful Household Hints.

To test vinegar—pure elder vinegar scented essences like scented apples, and when evaporated slowly to dryness, gives out an odor like baked apples. A real vinegar from the evaporator, if distilled vinegar, gives off an odor similar to baked sugar. It is made of wine, the odor will reveal it.

To clean net curtains, put them to soak at night in clear water, using no soap or cleansers; in the morning use dirt wash and wash them clean, but then in water into which a little borax has been put to whiten them.

To keep aluminum bright, rub it with a polish made of 20 grains of borax dissolved in water, to which one-third as much ammonia as water has been added. The mixture should be kept in a corked bottle and well shaken before using. When much blackened, this was brought on by being placed in an oven and kept there at moderate heat for a couple of hours.

To make a beneficial and most palatable syrup for colds and sore-throat, grate the yellow rind from one lemon and squeeze out the juice, letting it drop over two leaping teaspoons of sugar, and the juice and grated yellow rind of one lemon and let it stand about 20 minutes, then strain through a cloth. Care should be taken not to grate any of the white rind, and no water should be used.

To stop a violent fit of coughing, drink slowly, not milk into which a tablespoonful of glycerine has been stirred. To get set colors in laundering, soak pink, green, and lavender, purple and blue in a tub of water into which two ounces of alum have been dissolved. Dark blue, gray and black may be set by soaking them in salt water.

To keep books from yellowing expose the pages to the sunlight occasionally. A couple of tablespoonfuls of borax in the water in which they are washed will prevent the leather stains from the feet of light-colored stockings.

To overcome difficulty in peeling potatoes, wash them and put them in unsalted water to boil. When parboiled remove the peel—the skins come off easily, and then put them in boiling water, and the meat will finish cooking them. This not only saves trouble and time, but if quickly done adds to the quality of the potato.

To restore black goods that have taken on a grayish hue sponge them with alcohol. To wash lamp chimneys use a string dish mop, which will go into globes too small for the hand's entrance and reach all portions of the glass easily.

SMOKING OF HAMS AND BACON.

If there is no smoke house, barrels or dry goods boxes may be used for small amounts of meat. Much more care is necessary, however, when there is no smoke house.

The best fuel is green hickory or maple wood in connection with clean coals and sawdust. Corn cobs alone may be used and are better than soft wood.

The meat should be taken from the brine three days before hanging, washed carefully and thoroughly dried. They should be hung so that no two pieces touch. A slow fire should be started, and the meat warmed gradually. It should never be allowed to get cold. Never hang meat to smoke, when it is frozen, as smoke will not penetrate it. With an even temperature and a heavy smoke, twenty-four to thirty-six hours will sufficiently smoke the meat.

The hams and bacon may be kept for some time in the smoke house, if cool and dark. A dry, cool cellar may be used. For long-keeping, wrap them in paper, then in canvas or burlap and bury them in a grain bin or other such place where the temperature will be uniform and the flies excluded.
