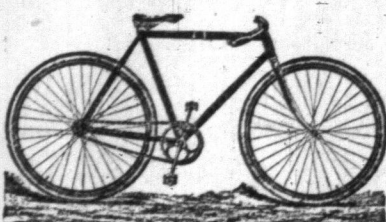

New York, June 13.—The case of Lynch vs. Lynch has developed the remarkable fact that for fifteen years Mrs. Theresa Lynch and her husband, John Lynch, lived in their home at No. 208 West Thirty-fourth street, but in all that time a single word never passed between them. On Friday last Mr. Lynch was removed from the house to a private asylum. Mrs. Lynch, who is reputed to be worth several millions, for nearly half a century has been prominently identified with the diamond trade in this city. The couple had a disagreement on business matters, the wife claiming he was extravagant in his habits, and this caused the long silence between them.

EATEN BY ANTS.

An Abductor's Horrible Fate Among the Indians of Mexico.

Chicago, June 13.—A special to the Record from El Paso, Tex., says: A mining man who reached here from Sinaloa, Mex., to-day, tells the story in detail of a horrible punishment recently inflicted on a prospector named Wilson by Mayo Indians. Wilson frequently visited the villages and finally won the affections of a handsome young girl. Instead of marrying the girl according to the rites of her tribe, he is said to have decoyed her to his camp in the mountains and kept her there against her will. She finally escaped to tell the story and Wilson fled. He was overtaken and carried back.

As a punishment for his crime it was ordered that he be put to death by a method common with the Mayos. The prospector was stripped of his clothing and bound across an ant hill infested by large red ants. After many hours of horrible suffering, as the insects slowly gnawed away his flesh, Wilson expired. Wilson was reputed to be a fugitive from justice from Oklahoma.

INCREASE THE PENALTY.

A citizen suggests as a remedy for the tramp nuisance, that the Government amend the vagrancy law from six months to two years in the limit, in the discretion of the magistrate, as the penalty for this offence. THE MARKETS

CHATHAM GRAIN MARKET.

J. B. Springer & Co., give the following grain gossip: Wheat.—The market is up 8 cents a bushel in Chicago. The flour trade in Canada has not yet been affected by the raise, consequently the price of wheat here remains unchanged. Should the Chicago market hold the strength it has gained, the price of Canadian wheat will go up.

Oats.—Receipts very light, and nearly all receipts are being taken for local use at higher prices than can be obtained from export agents. The top price for export is 25 cents and the street prices are from 25 to 26 cents.

Corn.—No receipts and very little demand. The value is from 34 to 35c. per bushel.

Beans.—A number of cars sold recently for United States points, but, as dealers are anxious to get rid of some of their stock, the price is no higher, and they were obliged to accept prices they had refused a little while ago. With stocks now pretty well reduced, somewhat better values in the next sales may be looked for. The best prices now for choice primes is \$1.40 per bush.

Wool.—Receipts light and so far they have not been over a quarter of what they were last year up to the present. This may be accounted for by the cool weather and late shearing. The drop in the London, England sales of May of 7 1/2 per cent., gives a much better feeling to the trade, so that prices are only a little higher than last season. About 15 cents is the outside value for washed and nine cents for unwashed. A third off these prices is paid for rejects both in washed and unwashed.

HOUSEKEEPERS' PRICES.

Saturday's market was one to delight the eye of the busy housewife. All the choicest products of the season were displayed in quantities. The great bulk of the market was taken up with offerings of potatoes. The choicest could be purchased for 50c. a bag. The other side of the market was chiefly occupied with green onions. Strawberries were the only fruit in evidence, and the berries sold at two boxes for 25c. They looked ripe and luscious. Green currants were offered in some quantity at eight cents a quart. In vegetables, onions at 2 bunches for 5c., radishes at 3 for 5c., and asparagus at 3 for 10c. were ready sellers. In the dried butter was somewhat scarce and firm at 15c. a lb. Eggs were in some quantity, but the price was rather higher than usual, 11c. Parties from towards Blenheim say the eggs are scarce there and dealers are paying 12 cents. The buyers were paying 10c. here-to-day. Spring chickens sold at 20c. a piece. Older chickens sold at from 25c to 30c. each. The fish market was well stocked, and did a good business, herring, pickled and white fish being the chief sellers. Butter, 12 to 15c.

Eggs, 11c. Potatoes, 50c to 60c. a bag. Rhubarb, 25c. a bunch. Asparagus, 4c. a bunch. Green onions, 2 bunches for 5c. Radishes, three bunches for 5c. Lettuce 20c. a pound. Tomatoe plants, 15c. a box. Strawberries, 15c. a box. Carriage plants, 15c. a box. Chickens, 25 to 35 cents. Spring chickens, 30c. Ducks, 25 to 30c. Turkeys, 75 to \$1.25. Lamb, 9 to 10c. Mutton, 5 to 6c. Pork, 7c to 8c. Beef, 5c to 6c.

Bran \$13 to \$13.50 asked; and shorts \$14 to \$14.50, asked, west. Corn—Firm. No. 2 American yellow at 45 1/2 on track here; and mixed at 45c. Pease—Quiet and easy. Holders show some disposition to clean up for the season. Car lots, north and west 58c., and east, 59c. Barley—No. 2, 39 cents, west, and 40c. east. Rye—Firm. Car lots 52c. west and 53c. east. Oats—Easy. White oats, north and west, 26 1/2 to 27c., and east, 27 1/2 to 28c. Buckwheat—Quoted at 50c. west, and 51c. east.
