## THEY ALL TAKE 'EM

Even Royalty Will Absent-mindedly Carry Off an Umbrella.

King George of Greece had an Embarrassing Time in Paris Streets

Paris, Oct. 22.—King George, of Greece, who is now visiting Paris semi-officially, came near being arrested on the street as a common thief. He had dined alone at a good but unpretentious restaurant. After King George had settled his bill the waiter helped him on with his overcoat, handing him a tightly folded umbrella, which the king absent-mindedly placed under his arm, not remembering that he had no umbrella when he entered the place.

The owner of the umbrella only discovered his loss when he himself was leaving a half-hour later. The proprietor of the restaurant paid for the lost article. Nevertheless, two hours afterward, when the man, walking the boulevards, chanced to meet the king with the umbrella still under his arm, he assaulted him with great fury, calling him harsh names. A great gathering immediately formed. The king, confused, looked really guilty, despite his apologies and embarrassed protests.

A policeman invited both contenders to come to the station, when suddenly two men dashed through the crowd and whispered magically quieting words to the offending officer and the owner of the umbrella, and then made a passage for the king, who got away before anybody else could learn his identity.

When King George's assailant learned of his mistake he immediately set about to atone. A silver handled umbrella which King George of Greece once stole from a private citizen, who by luck and chance succeeded in recapturing it the same day. He had already reached \$50 when the police concluded to interrupt the proceedings, ordering the crowd to disperse.

## A CHARITY SERMON.

Eloquent One Preached by Rev. Caesar Keiran, O. F. M. in St. Joseph's.

Count Zeppelin Made a Successful Ascent.

Friedrichshafen, Wurttemberg, Oct. 22.—Another trial of Count Zeppelin's airship was made yesterday, resulting in a series of successful evolutions. The airship with Count Zeppelin and Herr Eugene Wolff on board, ascended at 5 o'clock to an altitude of five-eighths of a mile, where various manoeuvres were executed. It then descended slowly to the water, which it reached near the point of departure at twenty-five minutes past 5. The king and queen of Wurttemberg witnessed the trial.

## HARVEST FESTIVAL.

The annual harvest thanksgiving services, held in Christ Church yesterday, were unusually interesting. The edifice was tastefully decorated, the work of the Young People's Society. The congregations at both services were large. Rev. Prof. Burgess of Huron College, was the preacher for the day, and his discourses proved both interesting and edifying. The musical portion of the services was, as usual, the subject of much favorable comment. The choir of the church, assisted by several local singers of repute, under the talented direction of Prof. Forsythe, rendered Hopkins' Morning Service in G, and Woodward's Matins Service in B. The chorus was especially brilliant in the rendition of Dr. Stainer's anthem, "Ye Shall Dwell in the Land," the fugue parts being marked by true precision.

Washington, Oct. 22.—John Sherman died at his residence in this city at 8:45 this morning in his seventy-eighth year. The immediate cause of death was described as brain exhaustion due to old age and to several illnesses during the past year and a half.
