London, July 2, 5.40-p.m.—The War Office has received the following despatch from Gen. Buller:

"Standerton, July 1.—Gen. Talbot Coke, with the 10th Brigade, reconnoitred on June 29th towards Amesfoort, Transvaal, and found 2,000 of the enemy there, with guns in a strong position. Having shelled them he retired, and was not followed up. His casualties were two killed and six wounded."

Cape Town, July 2.—The Times this morning prints an article condemning the proposed removal of the Transvaal seat of Government from Pretoria to Johannesburg. It will probably be three months before the country will be ready for the resumption of its usual industries. Allied Force Halted.

Wm. St. John Brodrick, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, was received with exclamations of astonishment and dismay.

Sir Edward Bartlett enquired if any information had been received from the Legations at Pekin, or as to the composition or the commend of the relieving forces, and its present position.

Mr. Brodrick read the despatch received to-day, and said the total alleled force' available is now about 13,000, as troops have been rapidly arriving, adding:

"We do not yet know what arrangements have been made locally regarding the command of an expedition, but it has not yet been thought possible to attempt a further advance. The Consuls have been in communication with the Viceroys in the Yang Tse Kiang region, and they are quite aware that support will be given them by Her Majesty's Governments in preserving order, it is obviously impossible that the representatives of the powers at Pekin should be consulted, as no communications are passing with them."

From Admiral Bruce.

London, July 2, 12.45 a. m.—A despatch from Admiral Bruce to the Admiralty, sent via Chefoo, under date of June 30th. says:

"The conduct of Commander Stewart, of the Algerine, and Commander Hause, of the German gunboat II-tis, at the bombardment of the Taku, forts was magnificent, and elicited the admiration. tis, at the bombardment of the Taku, forts was magnificent, and elicited the admiration of the allied ships. The river route to Tien Tsin, 51 miles from Taku, is now open. The railway head is now nine miles from Tien Tsin. The road inward is not quite safe, and communication to Tien Tsin is difficult.

"A fort 13 miles above Taku was found deserted by Lieut.-Commander Keyes and was blown up, leaving the passage up the river

Commander Keyes reports that the arsenal at Tien Tsin was captured June 29 by the navai brigade. The losses were 5 killed, Lieut. Colomb slightly wounded, and a gunner and 21 men wounded. There are no further details.

"Warrender is in charge of all our forces on the river and lines of communication.

"Vice-Admiral Alexiff, Governor-General of Port Arthur and Commander-in-Chief of the Russian forces in the East, has arrived on his way to Tien Tsin, taking supreme command of the Russian forces landed to date.

"Germany has 44 officers and 1,300 men: Great Britain, 84 officers and 1,700 men; Austria, 12 officers and 1,270 men; America, 20 officers and 329 men; France, 17 officers and 3,709 men, and Russia, 117 officers and 3,61 men, in the account of the guns and 36 machine guns."

Mr. Ledyard is Disconsolate.

Detroit, Mich. July 2.—President Henry B. Ledyard, of the Michigan Central, whose daughter is Baroness Von Ketteler, is nearly prostrated by the news from Pekin. Fatalities have done much in recent yoars to affect the prominent railway official, first his wife expiring suddenly, and then, after the war in the Philippines was thought to have been almost over, his son was killed. Last week Mr. Ledyard took some hope. When the first report of the death of Baron Von Ketteler was not confirmed, his friends pointed out the discrepancies which gave room for doubt, and Mr. Ledyard lived in expectation of seeing a denial of the first rumor that his son-in-law had been murdered. When apprised of the latest cables from the Orient, Mr. Ledyard refused to be further comforted, although he had received nothing official himself. The one point which is worrying Mr. Ledyard and the many friends of his daughter is that nothing has come about the safety of Baroness Von Ketteler. The reports tell of the razing of the German embassy, and as she was there with her husband there is a terrible fear that the heathens may have treated her as they have other unfortunate Christians. Baron Von Thielman, the German Minister at Berlin, who attended the marriage of Baron Von Ketteler and Miss Ledyard here in 1897 has promised Mr. Ledyard to Inform line of everything by cable, but no word was received to-day.

Manner of Kettler's Death.

Manner of Kettler's Death.
London, July 2.—Official despatches confirm in the fullest manner the report of the butchery of Baron Von Kettler, the German Minister, on June 18th. The Ambassador was riding on the Legatton street when he was attacked by Chinese troops and Boxers, dragged from his horse and killed. His body was hacked to pieces with swords. The German Legation and six other buildings were burned, and a number of sayvants of the Legations were killed and their bodies thrown into the flames.

The Consuls entertain little hope that any foreigners are left alive in the capital. There were 100 foreigners - connected with the Legations, 50 in the custom house, English and American tourists and others to the number of 150, and, nearly 500 Legation guards.
