CONTRACT FOR OATS,

COMMISSARIAT, NOVA SCOTIA.

Halifax, June 9, 1852.

THE Deputy Commissary General will receive Sealed Tenders, in duplicate, (to be marked on the envelopes "Tenders for Oats") at this Office, until 12 o'clock, on SATURDAY, the 24th of July next, for the supply of such quantities of OATS as may be required for Her Majesty's Service in the West India Command during the year, from the 1st April, 1853, to 31st March, 1854, inclusive.

The estimated quantities required monthly for the Service of each Station, are as follows, but more or less may be called for according to the requirements of the Service:

Table with 2 columns: Item and Average monthly issues. Items include Berberis, Demerara, Tobacco, Trinidad, Grenada, St. Vincent, St. Lucia, Dominica, Antigua, St. Kitt's, Barbadoes.

The Oats to be of the best quality, perfectly free from stones, dirt, weevil, &c., the growth either of the United States or of British North America.

The Oats are to be delivered every two months into the Commissariat Magazines at each Station, at the CONTRACTOR'S EXPENSE, upon the requisition of the Senior Resident Commissariat Officer, and will be subject to the approval of a Board of Officers.

The Tenders must be accompanied by a letter signed by two persons of known property, engaging to become bound with the party tendering, in a sum not exceeding one third of the value of the estimated quantity of Oats to be delivered during the term of the Contract.

The packages containing the Oats will be returned to the Contractor on the occasion of each delivery.
