Necessities and Luxuries

Whatever other qualities the Finance Minister may or may not possess, he is evidently not lacking in a sense of humor. His list of luxuries proves this beyond a doubt. At their present soaring prices clothes are indeed a luxury, and they will be more of a luxury with Sir Henry Drayton's tax affixed to their cost. But in our rigorous climate we have not learned to do without them—at least the men have not learned to cut them down so near to the vanishing point as the women are doing. Clothes, therefore, for the present are a necessity. But when we go to the tailor to order a suit he tells us that he cannot make a suit today that will give any satisfaction in wear for forty-five dollars; that the most expensive clothing which a man can wear is cheap shoddy. A good suit will outwear two or three poor ones and it is economy to buy good cloth. It costs no more to make a suit of clothes out of good cloth than it does to make one of shoddy. The difference is the price in the cloth. Then Sir Henry Drayton steps in and says if you try to economize by buying clothes that will give you satisfactory wear and look well while you are wearing them I will tax you ten per cent. on their cost. The same thing happens when you go to buy a pair of boots. Shoe merchants tell us that a pair of boots that can be bought for less than nine dollars are shoddy. But if we persist in buying a good article we must pay the penalty of a luxury tax. The men

most hardly hit by this tax on clothing are not "those best able to bear it," but the salaried man, whose income has not risen with the advance in prices, but whose position requires him to appear neatly dressed. The rich can well afford to pay the extra cost of clothing, and the very poor may go to the second-hand clothing store or even beg cast-off clothing from house to house; but the clerk and the professional man with slim salaries must pay for the luxury of clothes

Self Feeder For Swine

One often hears the statement made that it does not pay to perhaps give pigs more than the most ordinary attention and the farmer can scarcely be blamed in this respect if his hired help is inexperienced and yet has to be paid as high a wage as a real good experienced man.

The keeping of a few pigs is practically always a paying proposition but, to make it more so, means must be restored to whereby the labour can be reduced to a minimum, particularly as the pigs are apt to receive the scantiest of attention in any case. Towards this end, therefore, it seems only natural to try to find out just how well pigs will thrive if allowed to feed themselves. By feeding themselves is meant the adoption of a "self-feeding" method whereby the pigs are allowed access to a limited supply of dry feed whenever they feel so inclined. This system is of value to the breeder who goes in for swine-raising on a large scale and also to the small farmer who has other countless duties to perform but finds the feeding of pigs the chore of all. The latter might find the "self-feeder" of great value particularly in reducing expenses.

With a view to gaining some definite information of the use of the "self-feeder" for swine, experiments have been carried on at the Experimental Farm, Agassiz, B. C. for several seasons. Comparisons have been made in the use of the "self-feeder" as against the trough-feeding method. As far as cost of feed is concerned, results go to show very little difference one way or the other but when the labour question is considered the value of the "self-feeder" cannot be ignored. This comparison of the "self-feeder" with the trough feeding method is being continued until absolute and definite results are obtained but up to date, however, the advantages of the "self-feeder" has been strikingly evident.

With all classes of feeders this advice can be used to advantage while it also may be made use of in the feeding of young sows up to breeding age. With mature breeding stock, however, it is wise to avoid the use of the "self-feeder." The "self-feeder" for swine has many features to commend it, one of the most important being the fact that, of all farm animals, none adapt themselves so profitably to this method as do swine. Where only two or three pigs are kept, the use of a "self-feeder" can hardly be recommended but, with more than ten pigs the adoption of a "self-feeder" is well worth a trial. Finally, as a means towards the reduction of the labour expense, the "self-feeder" has a distinct advantage over hand-feeding methods.
