The matter was then supposed by the trustees to be closed and in terms of sufficient clearness to leave no doubt of their judgment on the merits of the application of the medical staff for representation on the

The secretary is now asked "to inform the staff whether or not the board is determined not to recede from the position it has taken," etc. To that question the secretary is not able to make reply, and most respectfully adds that as the staff have never reopened the matter since the trustees decided it as per the herein quoted extracts from the records, it would seem to him that the condemnatory resolution of the staff does injustice both to the trustees and to them-
