EDMONTON NEWS

INVESTIGATION AT ENTWISTLE.

Inspector Cuthbert, of Fort Saskatchewan, informs the Bulletin that an investigation will be made into the conduct of the Mounted police stationed at Entwistle. The investigation will be held by authority of the commissioner under the provisions of the Police act. Witnesses may be summoned and compelled to give evidence under oath and those professing to have knowledge of conditions alleged to exist there will be required to tell what they know of these matters.

FAREWELL AND WELCOME.

SMALL WATER PRESSURE.

As the result of the break down of the three million gallon turbine pump at the power house reported in the Bulletin Thursday the city will be without more than ground level water pressure till about the end of the week. Today the maximum pressure that can be obtained from the smaller pump is about ten pounds. In case of fire the new steam at No. 2 fire hall will be taken out and attached to the hydrant.

PRISONER ESCAPED AT FORT.

A prisoner named George Watson, serving a year's sentence at Fort Saskatchewan R.N.W.M.P. barracks for theft of a watch about six months ago at Lacombe, escaped from the guards on Sunday afternoon and has not been seen since. A large number of men are on the lookout for the escaped man, but it is thought that he has taken to the bush and is avoiding the more thickly populated districts. The police are of the opinion that it is only a matter of time before he is re-captured.

SCHOOL LANDS.

W. M. Ingram, commissioner of school lands, along with W. T. Rollins, J. O. Robinson and T. C. Morris, of Winnipeg, are at the Windsor Hotel, having arrived this morning from Lloydminster, where an auction sale of school lands was conducted on Wednesday. The sale was quite satisfactory," said Mr. Ingram to a Bulletin representative, "but evidently was not as good as the sale in Edmonton yesterday, when the Stoney Plain reserve lands were plucked on the market. Prices ranged from \$7 to \$20 per acre, and nearly all the land offered was sold. The party will leave shortly for Meadow, where an auction sale of lands will be held on Tuesday, June 29th. Similar sales will be held at Fincher Creek on July 2nd, and at Lethbridge on July 6th.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

TROUBLES OF A SYNDICATE.

The Bank of Hochelaga is bringing a suit in the Supreme Court before Mr. Justice Harvey against a syndicate comprising Messrs. Tessier, Picard, Roy and Larue, of Edmonton, to recover the amount of a promissory note for the sum of \$9,000. The defendants allege that they gave the note to secure notes given by Charles Carey in connection with the purchase from the syndicate of an interest in the Cardiff mines at Cardiff. Carey has been made a third party. He in his defence alleges that he gave the bank stock certificates whereupon the bank released the note. The defendants claim that the bank having handed Carey his notes they are relieved from further liability. The firm of Lucien Dubuc, with C. McCall, K.C., as counsel, are appearing for the bank, while O. M. Bigger is acting for the defendants, and J. McDonald for Carey.
