Ae few days before leaving St. Jacques he had the most sorrowful and trying experience of his life, viz., to break the news to the families of the drowning on the Banks of the two men, Emberley and Smith, The fatality happened on the 17th inst., and was witnessed by Capt. Denham and the cook of the schooner, who were powerless to render any assistance as all the dories were out. Fish was very plentiful and there was great competition amongst the dory crews.
