Matters Educational.

In perusing the remarks of Superintendent Burke and Hanrahan published in their last report on R. C. Schools, we came across certain of them which particularly attracted our attention. Both officials emphasize the importance of adequate training in the art of teaching.

Mr. Hanrahan remarks that "Our teachers are, with few exceptions, working well, and giving excellent returns to the taxpayers for their modest stipends. The disadvantage of more thorough training in scientific and practical teaching is, however, as apparent as it is unavoidable under our present inadequate facilities for professional training. In other countries similar conditions have been encountered and overcome (in a great measure) by the establishment of Summer Schools, where teachers meet and combine social intercourse with professional improvement, through the medium of lectures and discussions. The result is that the teachers return to their respective schools with new ideas, renewed interest in their work, and a more comprehensive grasp of what true education really means."

"At present, teaching, as understood in many of the elementary schools especially, means going through a certain routine of book work. Very little attention seems to be given to instruction in manners, deportment, accent, and general refinement of the

scholars—the vital importance of which can scarcely be overestimated. Mr. Burke also has a good word to say for the establishment of a Summer Schools for Teachers. In referring to the additional grant for training teachers he speaks eulogistically of the provision made for the training of teachers at St. Bonaventure's College and at St. Bride's Academy, Little Liddale. At the former institution he reports that

"While they (i.e. the pupil teachers) have ample opportunity of getting a thorough grasp of the various subjects necessary for receiving grades, they get regular instructions in the theory and practice of teaching. Throughout the years of training at the College, each pupil-teacher spends some time daily in charge of an elementary class. By interchange of class and subjects, practical experience is given in the course of the year in the various standards. One of the Brothers is present, and exercises a general supervision, hence, the pupil-teacher has the benefit of the suggestions of an experienced teacher, and of seeing, day by day, how a school may be managed."

And in reference to this work at Little Liddale, he says: "The female pupil-teachers are in residence at St. Bride's Academy, Little Liddale. In former reports, I have referred to the excellent work this Academy is doing, and, as I have already pointed out, the pupil-teachers here are fortunate in being trained under a lady, who is a certificated mistress of method from Mount Pleasant Training School, Liverpool, England, and is a L. L. A. of St. Andrew's University, St. Joseph's, Waterford Bridge, is used as the practising school."

Kaiser's Clemency.

LONDON, To-Day. It is stated that the Kaiser will sign his satisfaction over the warmth of his reception by releasing Capt. French and Lieut. Brandon, serving four years for espionage.

LONDON, To-Day. British pride received a jar in the House of Commons when Mr. McKenna, the first lord of the Admiralty, admitted in reply to a question that the States battleship Delaware would be the largest ship at the Coronation naval review, surpassing even H.M.S. Neptune. The London Standard and Chronicle utter editorial protests against the decision to exclude the press from the deliberations of the Imperial Conference.

PARIS, To-Day. Countess Polocki, sister-in-law of the millionaire Count Polocki, who was divorced from her husband, has been found living among a colony of dustmen in extreme poverty, but buying food for her army of cats and dogs. The Countess at one time was the most handsome and fashionable woman in the society of Paris.

Two Men Drowned.

Mr. D. Burke, who outfitted the banker Marion at St. Jacques, arrived here by the Portia this morning. A few days before leaving St. Jacques he had the most sorrowful and trying experience of his life, viz., to break the news to the families of the drowning on the Banks of the two men, Emberley and Smith. The fatality happened on the 17th inst., and was witnessed by Capt. Denham and the cook of the schooner, who were powerless to render any assistance as all the dories were out. Fish was very plentiful and there was great competition amongst the dory crews. Smith and Emberley overloaded their boat when they hauled their trawls, and as they got near their vessel the wind too increased, tilted the dory and she sank under them. They struggled in the water a few minutes and then sank to rise no more till the trumpet sounds for the general judgment. The Marion arrived at Sydney on the 20th and telegraphed the sad news to Messrs. Burke Bros. They got Rev. Fr. Joy to break the news, but his kind and sympathetic heart could not stand the ordeal, and when he and Mr. D. Burke went to Mrs. Smith's house, the latter soon found that he was left alone. Poor Smith left a father, mother, wife and three children. Mr. Burke says that he would not go through the same ordeal again on any consideration. This has been a hard season on the firm. Their schtr. Maple Leaf was lost on the Banks a few weeks ago but the crew were saved.

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A Topsail

Editor Evening Telegram:
Dear Sir,—Allow me to present a valuable paper to you, a disgraceful scene with residents of Topsail Sunday night, 21st inst. The so-called Mayor St. John's, spent the Sabbath papering, whitewashing their church. Surely the people of this town have a right to such conduct on the part of the gentlemen, if only in the youth? Twenty years ago
