Mongolian Had Rough Passage.

SOME SEAMEN HURT.

The s.s. Mongolian, Capt. Peters, ar ived here from Liverpool to-day at a.m. after one of the most stormy oyages which her commander ever experienced. She left Liverpool on Tuesday, the 5th inst., and on the 6th ran into a hurricane of wind from the S. W., which after several hours veered to the N.W. with a tremendous sed sea, and the ship had a hard of it wallowing in the waves, succeeded gale on the voyage and the ship's speed was greatly re-tarded. Sunday, the 10th inst., was a particularly stormy day and sea afer sea boarded the vessel and swep cross her decks. One huge wave which came on board hurled a lami trimmer named McPherson along the decks about tea hour and, throwing the man against the bulwarks, severely injured him. His shoulder was found to be dislocated when picked up, three ribs, were broken and he received alo several cuts and bruises He was taken into the ship's hospi tal and Dr. Bailey set the fractured ribs and otherwise attended to the man, who is now improving. Three others of the crew were thrown about by the same sea and were injured, but not as badly as McPherson. Thursday and yesterday the weather was also very bad, and as the ship came in over the Banks the weather came in over the Banks the weather was intensely cold. Dr. Bailey was formerly on the Pomeranian. There is a new purser on the ship also who was heretofore on the Parisian, which vessel is now being repaired at Glasgow. During the blow of Thursday pight the cargo shifted and grave the night the cargo shifted and gave the ship a decided port list. The ship rought 480 tons cargo and 12 bags and 7 baskets of mail matter. Her passengers were Mrs. John Browning Miss Ivy Dean, A. H. Seymour, 6 intermediate and 7 steerage. The Mongolian sails at daylight for Halifax.


