NOT MUCH TO REPORT.

PARIS, Nov. 25.—(Official.)

From the northern sea to Ypres there has been no infantry attack. We have gained ground between Lange-marck and Zonnebecke. Around La Bassee the Indian troops have retaken from the enemy several trenches lost the previous evening. From La Bassee to Soissons, it is relatively quiet. We have silghtly progressed near Berry au Bac and in the Ar-

At Bethincourt, to the northwest of Verdun, a German attack was repulsed. An armistice, demanded by the enemy has not been granted them. In Pont-a-Mousson district our artillery Pont-a-Mousson district out has succeeded in bombarding Arnaville. Nothing to be reported in the

Petrograd.—The battle of Lodz continues. The Russian cavalry charged the retreating German infantry on several points and inflicted on them heavy losses, also capturing some heavy German artillery. On the front from Czestochowa to Cracow action is developing to our advantage.

on the 22nd, we captured more than six thousand prisoners. A German counter attack failed.

Nish.—The Serbs have annihilated one part and repulsed the other part of an Austrian column which had crossed the river Kaloubara during the night of the 22nd. The battle is continuing on the front from Lazaeevatz to Minitza, where the Serbs compelled the Austrians to retreat, leaving in the hands of the former 500 prisoners and three maxim guns 500 prisoners and three maxim guns.

LLOYD GEORGE'S HEALTH.

The friends of Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, are anxious about his health. He is being severely overworked. In addition to his heavy labor in matters of Finance, he is on the Armanest and Pension is on the Armament and Pension Committees. He is working from early morning to late at night, and it is imperative that he be relieved of some of his responsibilities, if his health and strength are to be considered.

PREPARING FOR EMERGENCIES.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

England is preparing rapidly to repel any possible invasion by Germany. Along the east and south coasts of England these preparations, begun some time ago, are being pushed forward as speedily as possible. The work is chiefly in the hands of civilians. Emergency committees of citizens are being formed in several large towns. The principal measures large towns. The principal measures already planned look to the safe withdrawal of women and children from areas which may be threatened, and also the removal of live stock and provisions which would be useful to an invading army; the destruction of grain and other commodities which cannot be removed; the blocking of roads and the destruction of bridges. Rifle Clubs are being organized. The War Office has decided to recognize these clubs, many of which are now War Office has decided to recognize these clubs, many of which are now drilling. Only those who are eligible for service as regular soldiers or territorials may belong to such organizations. Members are required to

furnish their own equipment. The City of Hull, according to the Daily Mail, is divided into six districts. In each district is a committee of 200 prominent men, which will co-operate with the police. Similar committees have been formed at Deal, Sandwich, Folkestone, and several other towns, the Mayors usually acting as chairman.

ROYAL NAVAL LOSSES.

LONDON, Nov. 26. Thus far during the war, the Royal Navy has lost 4,329 officers and men killed, and 473 wounded; while 968 men are missing and 1,575 are captives or have been interned.

BOOM IN SHIPBUILDING.

LONDON, Nov. 26. One of the results of the war has been the great boom in shipbuilding centres. In the North of England the yards have booked orders for 200,000 tons of new shipping, while on the Clyde alone orders have been given for 50,000 tons.

GERMAN DIPLOMACY.

LONDON, Nov. 26. The German Emperor, according to despatch from the Hague to the Exchange Telegraph Company, has ordered Von Jagow, the German Minister of Foreign Affairs, to notify all German-diplomatic agents who hitherto have been empolyed in countries now at war with Germany, that they can consider themselves free to choose another career.
