Your Boys and Girls.

Children can be taught to use individual judgment from early infancy when he should be taught to choose certain paths of action for himself. Household Notes.

When sewing buttons on, if a narrow piece of tape is threaded through the button, a small hole, pierced through the article, the tape drawn through, and the ends of the tape stitched flat and firmly down on the wrong side, the button will be found to last almost as long as the article.

To mend a worn stair carpet, loosely darn the worn places with coarse light wool. Then with water-colors tint the wool with the principal shades in the carpet. Move the carpet so that the mended places come just below the stair edge, and if it is tinted carefully the patches will hardly show.
