Report of Arbitration Board.

We beg to submit the fellowing unimous finding:-

Recognition of Unions. This arbitration board orders that Reid-Newfoundland Company

1.—Recognise the right of their the purpose of adjusting industrial differences and all minor conditions governing their employment.

2.—That this right, however, is not to be considered as a right to the future home in Burin North. closed shep, the present labor con-ditions in Newfoundland being what they are.

3.—That the Reid-Newfoundland Company shall not be required to negotiate except directly with their own employees or representatives of their own employees.

Classification of Labor. This arbitration board orders

three-fold classification of labor. Such classification of labor, however, in order to prevent unjust discrimination shall be made by duly appointed responsible representatives selected by the employees on the one hand and by the company on the other. Should such joint committees fail to arrive at a decision, the matter in dispute should be referred to an arbitration board. If, however, a permanent arbitration board be not already established such a board shall be composed as follows: One representative to be appointed by the employees of the particular department concerned, one by the company and the third to be selected y these two.

Rate of Wages.

The arbitration board has no emed it wise to make any general change in the schedule of wages since it finds that the larger number of the Reid-Newfoundland Company employees are apparently contented with the present scale of payment and further that said scale has only a short time to run. But in view of the fact that the board has order ed three classes of boilermakers and three classes of blacksmiths it thinks it proper to fix their rate of wages The arbitration board therefore, or ders that first class boilermakers receive 50 cents per hour; seco class boilermakers receive 46 cents per hour; third class boilermakers receive 42 cents per hour; and that first class blacksmiths receive 50 cents per hour; second class blacksmiths receive 45 cents per hour third class blacksmiths receive 40 cents per hour.

This arbitration board orders that in view of conditions discovered by its examination into similar industrial conditions outside of Newfoundland, and by reports received by it from labor leaders:

(a)—That overtime at the rate of time and a half be allowed for work outside of regular hours up to midnight, and double time after mid-

(b)-That men called to work after regular hours shall receive double ime for actual time worked.

This arbitration board orders that he men who went out on strike shall ceive retroactive pay from April

St. Patrick's Day, Empire Day, Labor Day, Regatta Day, and all other gazetted whole holidays. Should any of the above mentioned holidays fall on a Sunday, the day proclaimed by the Governor shall be observed.

Double time will be allowed for all Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year's Day and Good Friday.

From December 1st to May 1st, double time will be allowed for men working outside of regular hours at exposed work on dry docks and on ships. Men will not be laid off during regular working hours to equalize overtime made.
