Shaped like a ship, and beautifully modelled, nefs were nearly always made by the seventeenth century silversmiths who crowned heads. Their ostensible use was to hold wine or other beverage in the hull of the vessel, the liquid being delivered through a spout in the bows. Kings made presents of them to other kings. Most nefs were so constructed that the wine, being once enclosed could not be tampered with: no slight advantage in the days when poison was a recognied agent
