The Day of Atonement, in Hebrew om Kippur, falls this year on October 8th. It is celebrated with a profoundly impressive ritual service on the evening of the 7th and all day of the 8th. Observant Jews fast on this day and sedulously refrain from all labor or secular matters, considering it a Sabbath of Sabbaths. The fast occurs on the 10th day of the month of Tishri according to the lunar Jewish calendar and is prescribed in Leviticus 16 and 23, where it is entitled a Sabbath of solemn rest. No other feast or fast except the Sabbatic Year is designated so

On this day as on no other the personal and yet so powerfully communal that it seems to cleanse the soul of the worshipper as well as that of the community.
