CALM IN EGYPT.

LONDON, Nov. 25. A Reuter's despatch from Cairo stated that after Premier Ziwar had read the adjournment decree in Parliament to-day, the members quietly dispersed. A quarter of an hour later it was stated the Parliament building and adjacent streets were deserted. save for a few passers by. The city is completely calm, the despatch added, and there is no reason to anticipate that this condition of affairs will not last. The excitement has subsided, it was said, and a period of waiting betired to his country house for a rest.
