TO TUNNEL THE RIVER AT FOOT OF CENTRE ST.
Superintendent McCauley Would Simplify Street Railway Routes

BRING CRESCENT HEIGHTS CLOSE TO HEART OF CITY
The Cost Would Not Be Great and Must Be Done in Time

A tunnel 600 feet long and costing perhaps \$50,000 is suggested by Superintendent McCauley as a means of simplifying street railway routes between the heart of the city and the many people already residing on the plateau north of the Bow river. The scheme would enable the people on the hill to reach their work in the city in ten or fifteen minutes quicker than they are obliged to take the present routes by way of the Langston or Louise bridges as now proposed. The increased cost of the tunnel would be more than offset by the saving in the cost of the cars which would be made possible by the use of the tunnel. The tunnel would be made as a double track, a roadway for wagon traffic, and walks for pedestrians. The ground over the tunnel could be utilized by the city as a park, and as a point from which visitors might gain a magnificent panoramic view of the city.

His scheme is to build a new bridge across the river on Centre street at the same level as the present one, enabling cars to run across the river without taking a jog. At the bottom of the hill the tunnel would begin, continuing for 600 feet. An open cut would have to be made 400 feet farther to reach the summit of the plateau. Mr. McCauley figures that this would allow of a grade of seven per cent, which is one per cent less than the grade on the First street west subway. The cars with their present equipment take this grade easily. The tunnel could be made as a double track, a roadway for wagon traffic, and walks for pedestrians. The ground over the tunnel could be utilized by the city as a park, and as a point from which visitors might gain a magnificent panoramic view of the city.

BAD WEATHER COSTS THE U. S. A BILLION DOLLARS
Friday Was the Coldest Day Ever Known in April in Western States

SATURDAY WAS THE WARMEST EVER KNOWN
The Situation in Kansas, Nebraska and Other States is Very Bad

Chicago, April 30.—Yesterday was the warmest April day in eleven years. The thermometer said 64 degrees. Friday last was the coldest April day in the city in eight years, the temperature that day was 24 degrees. The range between the two Fridays was 40 degrees. This conflict of heat and cold and the exultant extremes will cost America a billion dollars in 1910. Last week's oats, cotton, corn, fruit trees, vegetables, wheat and other crops were damaged in a sum of \$500,000,000, and reports received from all over the middle west and south last night indicated that the extremely hot and dry weather now prevailing added to the damage. Warm rains, which are not forthcoming, are needed. The situation in Kansas and Nebraska is particularly grave, as they are being ravaged by the drought. It is estimated that 1,000,000 acres of spring wheat and other grains in the four states of the southern cotton belt have been abandoned or abandoned entirely.
