Some four years ago, under the provision of the B.C. Library Act, a Library Association was formed in Fernie, It was the intention of the Association to make a beginning and lay the foundation for a public library more in keeping with the needs of the city. It was expected that the council would give a substantial yearly grant to aid the Association in their work. This grant has not been forthcoming, however, and consequently the library has not developed as was expected. The time has now come when the present project must be abandoned and a more progressive olicy adopted.
