AN AWFUL CRASH!

Terrible Collision on the "Big Four" Railway.

Person on Either Train Escaped Injury.

CLEVELAND, O., May 15.—In the midst of a terrible storm of wind and rain two Big Four trains (a passenger and a freight) crashed into each other near Cleves, Ohio, this morning with awful effect, the full horrors of which are not yet known.

Both locomotives were shattered into a shapeless mass and rolled off the track.

Mayor Spencer is in receipt of the last revised draft agreement between the City uncil and General Manager Seargeant of the G. T. R., regarding the Grand Trunk shops. The company desire to concentrate their shops here, provided \$100,000 of a bonus is given them by the city, and the agreement stipulates what the company shall give for the money. For the purposes of comparison, the ADVERTISER summarise the provisions of the agreement as amended by the company, and in parallel column the amendments demanded by the city. The aldermen, as well as the general public, will see from these at a glance, that the two parties to the agreement are yet a long

THE PREAMBLE SAME IN EACH.

Clause 1—The company will agree to place their car works west of Toronto, and not including that city for the construction and repair of cars for the company's pur Clause 2-A proposal to grant a bonus of

Thereafter, as the work progresses, as each \$20,000 is expended, the mechanical superintendent shall give the company his certificate to that effect, and the corporation shall give checks on the bank for the same, provided, however, the last \$20,000 shall not be paid until the said mechanical superintendent shall certify the whole cost of the work, including the machinery, to the extent of \$30,000, is at least \$150,000, and that not exceeding \$30,000 has been nd that not exceeding \$30,000 has been ent on machinery for the works, and that he works have been constructed and built

Clause 5.—The company agrees that they will submit the plans and specifications to he corporation for approval, the corporation to have three weeks to approve of
