Death of a Pioneer.

There died at the residence of her son-
in-law, Mr. W. C. Mackay, Adelaide street,
last evening, Mrs. Catharine Henderson,
relict of the late Robert Henderson, of Kin-
cardine, Ont., in the 80th year of her age.

Deceased was born in Sutherlandshire,
Scotland, in 1810. In 1833 she came to this
country and was married to Robert
Henderson, and settled on a farm in the
township of West Zorra, Oxford county.

The couple removed in 1862 to Kincardine,
where Mrs. Henderson lived till about three
years ago, when she came to this city with
orders by which she lived up to the
time of her death. Out of a family of
nine children two only survive her, Mr.
John Henderson, of Kincardine, and Mrs.
W. C. Mackay, of this city. The cause of
her death was a paralytic stroke which she
sustained about two months ago, and
from which she never recovered. Deceased
was a life-long Christian, and was vouch-
safed by a large circle of acquaintances
and friends.
