Danced at the Waterloo Ball.
[London Daily Telegraph.]

A venerable lady completes to-day her 95th year—Georgina, Dowager Baroness de Ros. It was she—then in her 20th year—who on the eve of the battle of Waterloo danced at the ball given by her father, the Duke of Richmond, at Brussels. Her ladyship was born on Sept. 30, 1793, being the third daughter of Charles, fourth Duke of Richmond, who was a general in the army and colonel of the 35th Regiment. Her mother was Lady Charlotte Gordon, daughter of Alexander, fourth Duke of Gordon—a title which was revived in 1874 in favor of her grandson, the present Duke of Richmond. Lady de Ros married, on June 7, 1824, William Lennox Lascelles, twenty-third Baron de Ros, who died in January, 1874, when he was succeeded by his son, General Lord de Ros, who formerly commanded the First Life Guards, and is a Lord in Waiting for the Queen and the former Baron of Scotland. Two of Lady de Ros's sisters also survive—Lady Louisa Tighe, who will be 87 on Oct. 2, and Lady Sophia Georgiana Cecil, widow of the late Lord Thomas Cecil, who is in her 82 year.
