**Doing It in Style.**

London's Detroit Visitors Will  
Bring a Band and Quartet.

The Knights Templar Coming 100 Strong  
—Their Programme.

The Detroit News says: Detroit  
Commandery, No. 1, Knights Tem-  
plar, will go to London, Ont., Sept.  
16 to work the Temple degree for the  
Great Priory of Canada. This is the  
highest Masonic body of Canada. The  
Detroit Knights will leave the Michi-  
gan Central depot on a special train  
at 1:45 p.m. They will be met at the  
London depot by the Canadian  
Knights and escorted to the Tecumseh  
House. The American ritual degrees  
will be conferred at the Masonic  
Temple. Interest is added to the  
event by the fact that the Canadian  
Masons are discussing the advisabil-  
ity of discarding their present form  
of ceremony for that in use on this  
side. The Detroit Knights will be  
banquetted by the local Preceptory  
after the ceremony. The next after-  
noon an exhibition drill will be given  
at the Western Fair, Governor-Gen-  
eral Aberdeen and Lady Aberdeen be-  
ing present as guests. Delegates will  
be present from all parts of Canada,  
owing to the fact that the annual  
meeting of the Great Priory will be in  
progress. It is expected that the De-  
troit Knights will number 100 swords,  
and they will be accompanied by  
Schrense's band and the Mendelssohn  
quartet. Special exhibition drill will  
be given on the D. A. C. grounds next  
Tuesday.

**THE ADDRESS FIEND**

Will Make It Pleasant for Lord Aber-  
deen When He Comes Here—Great  
Doings.

Sarnia, Sept. 9.—The programme for  
the Lord Aberdeen reception has been  
outlined. On the arrival of the vice-  
regal train on the E. and H., at noon  
on the 14th, their Excellencies will be  
met by the mayor and town coun-  
cil, who will conduct them to car-  
riages in attendance. A procession will  
be formed on Front street, with a  
cavalry escort comprised of No. 3  
Troop (Mooretown), First Regiment of  
Hussars; military companies of the  
Twenty-seventh Battalion, with the  
battalion band; companies of the  
Boys' Brigade, fraternal societies in  
regalia, Indians from Sarnia, Kettle  
Point and Walpole Island re-  
serves; Indian Reserve Band, citizens  
in carriages, etc., and will proceed by  
way of the principal streets to Wol-  
lington Park. On the park, addresses  
will be presented by the mayor, the  
Indian chiefs and others, to which his  
Excellencies will reply. Citizens of the  
town and country will then be pre-  
sented to their Excellencies by the  
mayor. Then will come the Boys'  
Brigade inspection in the rink, fol-  
lowed by the flower festival in the  
evening.

Next day their Excellencies will  
visit the Collegiate Institute, the hos-  
pital and other places of interest in  
Sarnia, taking a trip through the  
tunnel and on the river, which will,  
it is expected, keep them pretty busy  
until their train leaves.
