CARLISTS BUSY. London, July 22.—Despite the denial of the Madrid correspondent of the Times other special dispatches from Madrid to the London morning papers, especially such as come by way of the frontier and elude censorship, continue to assert that the Carlists are active. For instance, the Madrid correspondent of the Standard says: The government continues to receive from civil and military authorities in many provinces alarming reports as to Carlist preparations. Arms and ammunition have been introduced by many mountain passes into Navarro, Aragon and Catalonia, it is supposed with the connivance of the local authorities on

Several moderate Republicans, like Senors Labre, Asecarate and Margell, tried to prevent an alliance with Weyler and his following of military malcontents, but in vain. Senor Castelar and his supporters also object to any association with Weyler, believing that he will be sure to play into the hands of the Carlists. who only want the pretext of a revolution to begin a civil war in half of
