OLD COUNTRY CROPS

Helped by Recent Rain-Better Prices for Wheat.

London, Sept. 25 .- Showers of rain have proved beneficient to the root crops and pastures, while at the same time making the land more favorable for plowing, the harvest being previously secured in prime condition. sued a very quiet, although a generally even, course. The attendance of buyers has continued on a small scale. The demand, as a result, has shown no appreciable increase, being for the main part confined to immediate wants. Supplies have been wholly adequate, adhered to a steady range of currensales passing have partaken of a re-tail character. Foreign sorts have also received a slow support, with no essential variation in current prices. The wheat average for the cereal year has been 26s 1d, while the mean difference is seen to be 2s 71/2d.
