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COMFORTS FOR THE CONTINGENT

What the Ladies of the Red Cross Society Are Sending Out for the Volunteers.

The ladies' committee of the Toronto Red Cross Society desire to make a statement of the comforts and supplies which they intend to send with the second Canadian contingent to South Africa. These articles are intended for the whole contingent, and the statement is given for the benefit of committees in other places who should have special regard to these articles.

A glance at the list of quantities will show that merino socks, sweaters, plain puddings, tobacco and cigarettes, canned vegetables and fruit are now most required, and the Toronto Ladies' Red Cross committee suggest that committees in other places who have not completed their supplies should pay special regard to these articles.

The supplies sent from Toronto are: 1,000 books, four barrels salt, 45 pounds of tobacco, 1,000 cigarettes, 30 plain puddings, 2,000 pounds prunes, 4 barrels sugar, 2,000 pounds jam, 5,000 envelopes, 100 pads, 1,000 pencils, 50 packs cards, 50 boxes dominoes, 50 checker boards, 90 gallons lime juice.

EAST BUFFALO, Jan. 4.—Cattle.—There were a few bunches on sale, mostly cows; the top price was \$35 for choice cows, the tone of the market being steady on the good kind; calves were in fair supply, moderate demand and lower; choice to extra were quotable at \$8 to \$8.50; good to choice, \$7.50 to \$8. Sheep and lambs.—The market was in good position, with 32 loads on sale, and fairly active demand; trade ruled about the same as yesterday; choice to extra were quotable at \$6 to \$6.25; good to choice, \$5.75 to \$6; common to good, \$4.75 to \$5.75; sheep, choice to extra, \$4.75 to \$5; good to choice, \$4.50 to \$4.75; common to fair, \$3.75 to \$4; the offerings were well cleaned up, and the close steady. Hogs.—The market was fairly active, on the basis of \$4.60 for heavy, mixed and Yorkers and pigs; rough, \$3.20 to \$4.10; \$2.75 to \$3.75; there were a few sales of medium and heavy at \$4.60, but the bulk of the sales were at \$4.60; the offerings were pretty well cleaned up, and the close steady.

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—The receipts at the east end abattoir this morning were 400 head of cattle, 40 calves, 50 sheep and 150 lambs. The demand was slow. Cattle.—Choice sold at 44c to 45c; good at 43c to 44c; lower at 42c to 43c. Calves were sold from 4c to 6c. Sheep from 24c to 34c per lb.; lambs were sold at 34c to 44c. Hogs were sold at 4c to 44c.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Receipts, 755; very little trade; feeling steady. Cables firm; refrigerator beef, 11 1/2c per lb. Exports, 30 sheep; tomorrow, 450 cattle and 4,400 quarters of beef. Calves—Receipts, 300; veals steady; barnyard calves lower; veals \$5 to \$9; tops, \$9.25; barnyard calves, \$3.25 to \$3.85. Sheep and lambs—Receipts, 4,250; sheep steady; 10c to 15c lower; sheep, \$3 to \$4.60; culled, \$2.50; lambs, \$5.75 to \$6.60; culled, \$4. Hogs—Receipts, 4,200; easy at \$4.80 to \$4.90; choice light state hogs and pigs, \$4.90 to \$5.

OLD COUNTRY PRICES. London, Jan. 4.—At Liverpool and here American cattle keep firm at 11 1/2c to 12c per lb, dressed weight; sheep sell at 11 1/2c to 12c per lb; lambs at 13 1/2c to 14c, dressed weight; refrigerator beef is higher, at 11 1/2c per lb.

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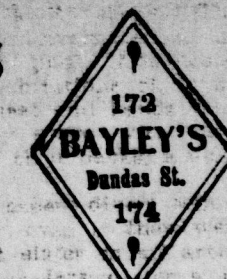
