The Council Wrestle With the
Library Question.

Interesting Debate on the Different
Schemes Proposed.

The Matter Goes Over for
Another Conference.

Inspection of the Port Stanley Road-
Bed Necessary. Election of a Freeman
for No. 2 Station. The Assessment of
1892 Adopted. Electric Light Bylaw
Decried.

The City Council held a late session last night, lasting until 1:15 this morning. The hall was crowded with interested spectators, who probably expected a lively wrangle over the free library question. Then there were also present about fifteen interested applicants for the position of fireman, about a dozen contractors, a delegation from the Trades and Labor Council, the Free Library Board, and several other persons.

There was a delegation present from the Trades and Labor Council in support of a resolution adopted on Saturday night, asking that the estimates be granted, and protesting against another vote on the question. Mr. Hessel supported the resolution.

Ald. J. W. Jones was on the Free Library Board five years ago and had then opposed the laying of the Mechanics' Institute. He did so then and did not for the public interest and for economic reasons. There was no use depreciating the value of the building, because the value was right there. Mr. James Darnall had given his opinion five years ago that it would cost \$7,000 to put the Mechanics' Institute into shape. This with the \$15,000 mortgage made up the amount of \$22,000 for a building alone, with the books out of the question. The money could not be raised by debentures and probably taken up by citizens and then, thus making an income of \$1,350. While this was so, and while the rents would be also considerable, the speaker contended that the institute could not be made into a suitable building. If a free library was going to be had, a free library ought to be had. The Mechanics' Institute was to be a lock of light, and claimed that the institute would be the cheapest in every way.

Mr. Wm. Scarrow was heard in support of the Mechanics' Institute, of which he is president. He ridiculed the idea that there would be a lock of light, and claimed that the institute would be the cheapest in every way.

Ald. Parnell contrasted the cost of the two buildings, and showed plainly that there would be a direct loss from the Mechanics' Institute scheme, and that the latter place was entirely unfit for the purpose required. Mr. Parnell laid special stress on the fact that the question of taxation had been brought up. No matter, he said, whether the institute was taken over, or whether a new building was erected; the money would be raised in the same way. Mr. Joseph Marks stated that there was no council. He suggested that a committee of the council meet a committee of the Free Library Board and argue the matter out in a gentlemanly manner.

Ald. Coo said that the city wanted a free library just as soon as they could afford it. But there was a big open city, and the cholera coming on. Then and go stuck in the mud. He advised the sewers in repairs of the city streets and building was put up.

Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald moved that the treasurer be instructed to communicate with the Ball Electric Light Company and request the payment of \$207.50 on poles that had been overlooked by the city. Carried.

Ald. Garratt gave notice of motion: 1. That vault accommodation be provided for the civic books. 2. That the city offices be moved on to the ground floor, and that the plans for the necessary alterations be submitted to the joint committee of the City Council and Free Library Board.

Ald. Coo gave notice of motion appointing himself, Ald. Dreaney, Stevely, Scarrow and Shaw a committee to wait on the London Street Railway Company to ask them when they intend to introduce an electric system.

L. AND P. S. RAILWAY.
A message was read from the mayor, supplemented by a resolution from the city solicitor, asking that an engineer be employed to look over the roadbed and find out what repairs are necessary. Immediate attention to the resolution was asked for, as the matter was an important one, on which hinged the rents of the first year or two.

Some difference of opinion arose as to whether this matter should be sent to No. 1 committee or to the Port Stanley Board. Ald. J. W. Jones proposed the former and Ald. Taylor the latter.

The mayor then insisted on the reading of a letter from President Miller, of the L. and P. S. road, stating that the supports of the bridges north of and south of St. Thomas were in many places rotten, and needed immediate repairing.

Ald. Jones scored the mayor for making the letter public. The reason he had moved that the resolution go to No. 1 committee, was that they were the party of the council to deal with finance. The question was then put and Ald. J. W. Jones' motion carried on the following division: Yeas—Connor, Heaman, Coo, J. W. Jones, Moule, Stevely, J. Fitzgerald, Scarrow, F. J. Fitzgerald, Parnell, and Pritchett—11. Nays—Taylor, Thos. Jones, Carrothers, Garratt, Dreaney, Welford, and Shaw—5.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.
The report of No. 3 committee as presented by Chairman F. J. Fitzgerald, recommended that the resignation of Fireman James Fitzgerald, No. 2 station, be accepted.

Ald. Pritchett and Heaman moved that no appointment be made to fill the vacancy. There were only four men in London South, and why should there be five in London East, they asked. Ald. J. W. Jones took exception to this motion; all the valuable manufacturers were on in the east end, and it was necessary to have one more man there than in London South.

Ald. Carrothers moved in amendment that the different applications be read and voted on. Carried.

Ald. Coo got up and refused to vote for any man that he had not seen. One applicant, Ald. Parnell, suggested that each of the different applicants be paraded before the council; that his age be ascertained—by means of his teeth if necessary—that he have a doctor's certificate with statement of health weight and general accomplishments. This caused a laugh and then the voting began. Messrs. Scembrace and E. A. Rogers were the only two in the room, and the mayor cast his vote in favor of Scembrace, electing him. NUMBER TWO COMMITTEE.
Ald. Garratt read No. 2 committee's report. It recommended: 1. That construction of artificial stone walk on King streets between Maitland and William streets, and of tile drain on Queen's avenue between Fenton and Waterloo streets, be advertised. 2. That communication be made to the Electric Light Company of E. H. Day, claim for damages on accident on street railway tracks, be filed. 3. Repoles for electric wire purposes, we recommend that all poles erected hereafter be not less than 60 feet in height within the following areas and other streets if necessary: on the west, Dufferin avenue on the north, and York street on the south. 4. BYLAWS.

A bylaw was read to regulate the erection and maintenance of the electric light poles of the Canadian General Electric Light Company.
Ald. Parnell raised an objection to the half-mile limit, and moved in amendment that a clause be inserted bringing the further limits of London South within the boundary. There was no second, and Ald. Parnell then raised a point of order on the third reading, and moved that typewritten copies be forwarded to each alderman before next meeting and that the third reading be deferred until then. Carried. There was another bylaw to be read, but the clock had moved round to 1:15; the aldermen began to move out one by one, and in a minute there was no quorum.

Annual Reports from Various
Anglican Churches.

Financial Statements Presented and
Officers Elected.

Improvements to St. Paul's Cathedral
Advancing to Completion—Delegates
to Synod—Interesting Statements
from all the Churches.

St. Paul's Cathedral.
In submitting the annual report of St. Paul's Cathedral at the vestry meeting last night the churchwardens, W. J. Reid and John S. Pearce, congratulated the congregation on the work of enlarging and improving the cathedral, and urged generous financial assistance in bringing it to a successful completion. The financial statement showed that the cathedral expenditure was in excess of the receipts, which they felt should not be allowed. Woodthey felt should not be allowed. After the disbursements a balance of \$3,634.88 is left in the Agricultural S. and L. Co., to the credit of the cathedral building fund deposit. The expenditures include \$11,982.74 paid out to date on construction account. Salaries amounted to \$1,808.20; special collections, \$1,384.50; 1892 synod collections, \$1,384.50, and miscellaneous expenses, \$1,919.40.

The receipts on the Woodland cemetery account were \$4,890.81. Sales of lots realized \$2,123.05; and bank balances and sundries made up the rest. A balance of \$1,781.02 remained over last year, and somewhat less than last year.

Sunday school receipts were \$287.49, including the \$100 vestry grant. In the collection account \$210 was raised, \$120 of which went to the support and education of Joseph Loney, the Indian boy at the Port Hope school. The balance was devoted to missions.

The officers of the Church Workers' Association are: President, the Dean of Huron; vice-presidents, Rev. J. O. Crisp, Mrs. G. M. Innes, Miss Cross, Mrs. J. Labatt, Mrs. Callard; secretary, treasurer, Miss Priddy. Receipts were \$459.62, and \$24.22 was left.

The Mother's Meeting report alluded to the death of an esteemed member, Mrs. Breen. Twenty-one members were on the roll. Officers were: Mrs. Callard, Mrs. Slater, Mrs. McLintock, Miss Meredith, and Mrs. Turville.

A. M. A. reported 60 members, an increase of twelve. The mission at present was working for Rev. Mr. Mathison, whose mission was about 100 miles from Battleford. Officers: Mrs. Innes, Miss Cross, Miss Crisp, Mrs. Becher, Mrs. F. J. Fitzgerald, Parnell, Shaw, Pritchett—12. Nays—Taylor, Moule, Carrothers, Dreaney, Welford—5.

Belia Jewell, for the Y. P. S. C. E., reported encouraging progress. They had now 70 members. They were remitting money for the education of a little Indian girl in Manitoba. These reports were all accepted.

The rector appointed Mr. W. J. Reid his churchwarden and Mr. J. S. Pearce was elected people's churchwarden.
