THE MARKETS.

ALL EXCHANGES CLOSED.

New York, March 28.—There was general observance of Good Friday in Greater New York. The six exchanges of the city, New York stock, commodities, cotton, coffee, produce and metal, suspended business, and there was no sugar market. Of the larger financial houses only the banks were open for business. Services were held in a majority of the churches. The produce market was closed. The produce market will be the only exchange to resume tomorrow, the others having adjourned until Monday.

Chicago, March 28.—Services in the Catholic churches and in many Protestant churches, and the closing of banks, the board of trade and the stock exchange, marked the observance of Good Friday in Chicago. The produce market alone continued as usual. The board of trade will resume business tomorrow, but the stock exchange will remain closed till Monday.

FOR HOUSEKEEPERS.

As the market here is looked upon as one of the most important during the year. The attendance today was not half as large as was expected. This may be attributed to a certain extent to the rain in the early part of the morning, and the disagreeable weather which followed. Business was brisk and sales as a consequence were easily made. Prices for most of the produce offered were a trifle firmer.

Hay and Straw—There was lots of room for the hay on the market this morning; only one load offered, selling at \$5.50 per cwt. Monday should be a good day to sell hay, as quite a lot is required for the horses at the fair grounds.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was in large supply and in keen demand, with prices a trifle higher, at 10c to 12c per lb. for butter, cream and 2c to 2c for pound rolls. Eggs were in large supply, at 12c to 12c for crate and basket lots; 12c to 12c for small lots and by the single dozen.

Poultry—Considering the season of the year there was a large amount of all kinds of poultry on sale; prices were a shade easier; turkeys sold at 12c to 12c per lb. wholesale; ducks, per pair, 75c to \$1; chickens were plentiful, at 60c to 60c per pair; live chickens sold at 45c to 60c per pair, with 50c per pair as the ruling price.

Dressed Hogs—Not many offered; on sale at \$1.50 to \$1.50 per cwt, mostly at the last-named figure.

Vegetables and Roots—There was a large display in this line by the market gardeners; potatoes sold at 60c to 75c per bag; green onions, 20c to 30c per dozen bunches; rutabaga 75c to \$1 per dozen; lettuce, 20c to 30c per dozen; cabbage, 20c to 50c per dozen; other vegetables as quoted.

Apple—Scarce, at prices quoted.

Meats—Well represented, particularly veal; prices are about as quoted.

Live Hogs—Mr. D. McIntyre will pay \$5.50 per cwt on Monday for selects, an advance of 10c per cwt over last Monday's prices.

There will be no change in the prices for hides from those quoted during the month of April.

Maple Syrup—Very little on sale at \$1 per gallon.

CANADA AT CORONATION

In the Street Decorations When the King Is Crowned.

Whitlaw Reid May Not Be the Special Ambassador From the United States.

London, March 29.—One of the most effective street decorations on coronation day will be a Canadian arch of grain, emblematic of the agricultural resources of the Dominion and similar to the one in Winnipeg admired by the Prince of Wales. Lord Strathcona will present the proposal of the Ottawa Government to the Westminster council after Easter, and Lord Onslow, as chairman, will undoubtedly display sympathy for the colonies by accepting it and availing himself of the services of Canadian decorators. Lord Strathcona has already received a request from the council to submit a decorative design for the Canadian arch.

IN RE WHITLAW REID.

William Waldorf Astor's Pall Mall Gazette published a letter from its New York correspondent, which says: "At the present moment it is by no means a foregone conclusion that Whitlaw Reid will be accredited as special ambassador from this country. The outcry against his official representation of this country is so great that I would not be surprised to find the president eventually backing down on this point."

"The truth is, Mr. Roosevelt is expecting re-election, and the votes have to be considered. In this way even the president cannot always obey the innate promptings of a gentleman in extending the courtesy of his official representation to this country. It is stipulated that the convention be ratified within three months from the day it is signed."

The Times correspondent says further that China is inclined to agree to Germany's demand for the extension of the railway from Tsinan Fu in Shan Tung province, across the Grand Canal to the Yangtze River, on the Peking-Hankow line.

ATLANTIC STEAMER RATES.

Liverpool, March 28.—The secretary of the North Atlantic Steamship Conference announced today that the continental lines had signed the agreement fixing the minimum saloon passage rates.

CABLE NOTES.

Within a month over 10,000 troops will be sent from England to South Africa.

The Hague Dagblad announces authoritatively that the conference of the Queen Wilhelmina is expected next September.

The Chinese Government has instructed the viceroy of Canton to suspend negotiations with the French syndicate for the Canton-Fatshan Railway, as this project is calculated to affect the rights of the American syndicate under the Washington contract of 1898.

Cableing from Shanghai, the correspondent of the Standard says that Dr. W. A. P. Martin, former president of the Imperial University at Peking, will be asked to return as president of the university at Yü Ching and foreign adviser to all the Chinese high officials in the provinces of Hupeh and

COTTON IN WEST AFRICA.

The German Colonial Economic Society of Berlin has issued an elaborate report on the work of the experimental cotton plantation in Togo, West Africa, managed by J. N. Colson, who has three young negroes from Booker Washington's school at Tuskegee, Ala. Supt. Calloway's statement to the society, which is included in the report, says: "Our experience has given us every reason to believe that in a few years it will be possible to export many thousands of bales from the colony of Togo. This will not only be a great boon to the markets of the world, but it will be of advantage to Germany and especially to the two and a half millions of natives in the colony."

PRAYER FOR PEACE.

A "prayer for peace" was the only novel feature of the observance of Good Friday in Great Britain. The Bishops of London, Rochester and St. Alban's issued special appeals to their dioceses to unite in prayer that both British and Boers be granted the triumph of peace, pointing out that similar prayers were being offered in the Dutch churches at Pretoria. A Sunday atmosphere pervaded the service. The government offices are shut up, and the war office announced that seven Lord Kitchener's fast days will not be issued on Good Friday or Monday.

CALL FOR 50,000 TROOPS.

The Turkish Government has decided to call to the colors 50,000 irregular troops. This mobilization is ostensibly for the annual maneuvers, but in view of the conditions in Macedonia, considerable significance is attached to the movement.

A Sofia dispatch says: One hundred and fifty Turkish troops attacked a Bulgarian post near Saratash yesterday. One Bulgarian was killed and several were wounded. The Bulgarian camp is being reinforced by two companies of soldiers.

COL. GRIMM'S OFFENSE.

Col. Grimm, the Russian officer, who is charged with revealing Russian military secrets to Germany, has been brought here and placed in close confinement. The statements emanating from Vienna and cable to the United States that Col. Grimm has already been tried and sentenced to death on these charges by a court-martial at Warsaw, are incorrect. He will soon be tried on charges at St. Petersburg.

In the case Col. Grimm cannot be executed, because in Russia the betrayal of military secrets is not a capital offense, unless that betrayal be made to a power with which Russia is at war.

THREE PRINCES EXECUTED.

In a dispatch from St. Petersburg the correspondent of the Daily Mail says that news has been received from Kutais, Transcaucasia, that three Russian nobles, Prince Theodor, Prince Valerian and Prince Zulkidze, were executed March 3 for the murder of over 100 persons. The trials of the principal leaders of the bandit organization, which has terrorized the Caucasus by systematic robbery, arson and murder, are now in progress.

THE MANCHURIAN TREATY.

The Pekin correspondent of the Times cables that Paul Lessar, the Russian minister to China, and Prince Ching, president of the Chinese foreign office, have agreed upon the main conditions of the Manchurian convention, and that the early signing of the agreement is expected.

CANADIAN NIGHT

AT THE TOURNAMENT

In Madison Square Garden, New York—Warm Reception Given the Canadian Minister of Militia and the Kilties.

New York, March 28.—This was Canadian Night at the military tournament, and the troops were reviewed by the Hon. F. W. Borden, Canadian minister of militia and defense. When the minister arrived at Madison Square Garden he walked down the center of the arena, accompanied by his staff, and proceeded by the detachment of 48th Highlanders and their pipers. The box of honor was decorated with their flags. The house rose in mass as the band played "God Save the King." The programme included the 48th Highlanders' exhibition drill, rough riding by Troop C, N. C. N. Y., the landing drill and battle exercises by the First Battalion of Naval Militia; the music by the 2nd Cavalry; drill and driving exhibition by the Fourth Battery, Field Artillery, U. S. A., and the popular exhibition of pontoon bridge building. The exhibition musical drill of the Canadian militiamen received great applause. Before coming to the garden the executive officers of the Military Athletic League entertained the Canadian visitors at the Lawyers' Club. The guests included Lord Aylmer, Adjutant-General Maude, Col. Pellat, Col. Charles E. Turner, and Major Robertson. This party, including Dr. Borden's wife and Gen. McLeese, Col. Barnes, of the 23rd Regiment, and Lieut.-Col. Brady, of the same regiment, sat in the reviewing box.

HOLOCAUST OF HORSES

Seventeen Racers and Promising Colts Perished in Frank H. Colby's Training Stables—Loss \$30,000.

Detroit, March 29.—Seventeen race horses and promising colts were burned to death today in a fire which destroyed the training stable of Frank H. Colby, a well-known driver and trainer, in Highland Park. Among the horses were the following: Red Royal, 2:24½, a five-year-old trotting stallion, valued at \$5,000; Harry P., trotter, 2:23½, \$2,500; The King, trotter, 2:26½, \$2,000; Maiden Queen, pacer, 2:13½, \$2,000; Monoc, 2:32½, trotting stallion, \$2,000. The total loss is about \$30,000.

RIVAL TELEGRAPH

PROMOTERS CLASH

Feud Between Marconi and Slaby-Arco Companies Takes an International Character.

New York, March 28.—The feud between the Marconi and Slaby-Arco wireless telegraph companies has become the subject of international diplomatic controversy, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Herald.

The German Government has, it is said, sent an official protest to the British Government against the methods of the Marconi company, and the boycott instituted against ships equipped

with the Slaby-Arco apparatus.

The refusal of the Marconi operator to receive or transmit messages sent from the Slaby-Arco transmitters, and especially the manner in which it is said the greetings of the Deutschland with Prince Henry on board were ignored at Nantucket, Lizard and Cornwall stations, is the cause.

As previously reported, the German navy department has framed a bill, which will be presented to parliament immediately after Easter, the purpose of which is to give the government authority to control wireless telegraphy and make uniform rates.

SWEPT AWAY!

A Tennessee Town Destroyed by Flood—Two Lives Lost.

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 29.—A special from Harrison, Tenn., says: Harrison was destroyed by the flood, due to the overflow of Emory River. The damage is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars. It is reported that two lives were lost and many more are supposed to have been drowned. It is estimated that from 40 to 50 houses at Oakdale and Harrison were washed away.

SAVED THE CREW.

New York, March 29.—The barkentine ashore at Long Beach, N. J., is the Antilla, Capt. Read, from Montevideo, for New York with a cargo of hides. She is about 200 yards off shore, head on. She is apparently full of water. The crew of nine men have been taken off in the breeches buoy.

NEARLY \$2,000,000

Of an Increase in Dominion Revenue Over Nine Months Last Year—Ill With Enteric Fever.

INCREASE IN REVENUE.

Ottawa, March 29.—The customs collections of Canada for March total \$2,323,397, a gain of \$283,162 over the corresponding month last year. For the nine months of the fiscal year the returns have totaled \$23,589,608, an increase of \$1,958,582 over last year's record.
