BOERS DO NOT REGARD SOUTH AFRICA AS LOST TO THEM

Think the Present Peace But one time, when the British were scouring South Africa for Dewet, the faman Intermission Between Wars.

"The Boers that I have met regard the present peace as but an intermission in the warfare in South Africa They do not regard their case as hopeless, but think that it is England's day today. Theirs will come later on, And when it does come, they profess to believe they will sweep the British out of the whole of Dutch South Africa." This is what Mr. A. P. Sainsbury told The Advertiser today. Mr. Sainsbury has just returned from Cape Town, South Africa, and is visiting his broth-er, Mr. Brice Sainsbury, of 29 Picton

"The trouble with the Boers," tinued Mr. Sainsbury, "lies in the fact that they have the Bible behind their natural pride and love of country. is, they believe that God intended South Africa to be the home of the Boers, and to be ruled by them, and on this point they are next to fanatical."

Neither have the Boers forgotten the ate war. They are very bitter, Sainsbury says, toward England, though they are not rersonal in their hatred. Though they may not make friends of Englishmen or Canadians, they do not hate them as individuals, but they do hate the country they come


