Mr. Macdonald's Address.

The address of Mr. J. A. Macdonald of the Toronto Globe at Windsor on Wednesday night created a most profound impression and has assisted Mr. R. F. Sutherland materially. He dealt with the issues of the day in his own impressive manner, and many votes were made for the Liberal candidate. Sutherland looks good.

Dr. Mearns Hurts.

Dr. Mearns, of Woodstock, who is doing splendid work for the Liberal candidate, Mr. E. W. Nesbitt in North Oxford, met with an accident at Princeton on Wednesday evening. His ankle was turned and he will be laid up for some time.

Meeting at Eden.

Mr. T. R. Mayberry and Mr. W. V. Rutherford addressed a large gathering at Eden on Wednesday night. This is in the center of a Tory Township, but the electors turned out in large numbers to hear Mr. Rutherford who delivered one of his best speeches. He is a speaker of more than ordinary ability, and his speeches are always of a high character. He is gaining ground daily, and there are many indications that Liberalism will come into her own in East Elgin. Mr. Mayberry delivered a fine address point-

ing out why the farmers should support the Laurier administration which had done so much to improve the conditions of the agriculturalists in Canada.

The Chatham Meeting.

One of the features of the Chatham meeting, held in behalf of Mr. H. S. Clements, the Conservative candidate, was the appearance of Dr. Shadd, a colored speaker from Regina. He had been brought all the way from the west for the special purpose of securing the colored vote in Chatham. During his speech, however, he threw a bomb into the audience by admitting that in the west there was no doubt that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would have a good majority of the seats after the election. He admitted that the sentiment west of Lake Superior was in favor of the Liberals, and that the Conservatives could not hope to win in the great west. This is not news to the Liberals, who know the conditions. The result of Dr. Shadd's admission was to thoroughly disconcert Mr. Clements' following, who have been told that Borden would sweep the west.

Election Notes.

A solid Middlesex for Laurier! Kent will do its duty, and on Oct. 26 it will be Mr. D. A. Gordon, M. P. for East Kent, and Mr. A. B. McCole, M. P. West Kent. The Conservatives boasted some time ago that there would be two Tory members from Essex county. However, they do not boast so much just now, as Sutherland and Clarke are a hard pair to beat. They are the right stamp of men for Essex. Dr. C. O. Fairbank, the Liberal candidate for East Lambton, is keeping up the good work, and is making a splendid run. The Conservatives are not

taking any chances on the election, but are keeping very close to their constituency. There are many Conservatives who are fearful of the result. The Liberal candidate is a clean man, of more than ordinary ability, and will make an ideal representative.

West Middlesex.

There have been stories circulated to the effect that Mr. W. S. Calvert, the Liberal whip, will have some difficulty in winning the seat, but such reports have no foundation. Mr. Calvert is backed by a united party, loyal, and in good fighting trim. The popularity of Mr. Calvert has not lessened one whit, and his large personal following has increased by his fair and just treatment of all his constituents. Mr. Calvert is addressing many meetings, and is showing how the great record of the Laurier Government has been of untold benefit to the farmers of Canada. He is being ably assisted by Mr. J. C. BRITISH

Accused of absconding from the local workhouse, a middle-aged widow explained to two Preston magistrates that she had received an offer of marriage by letter. The prospective husband renewed his offer in the court. The bench fined her 1s and wished her luck.

The board of guardians for Wandsworth, Hackney, Battersea, Lambeth, Southwark and St. Pancras are offering upwards of £1 each for the arrest of 1,025 husbands who have deserted their wives and children.

The authorities in the village of Holywell, Flintshire, have decided to sell an old fire engine which they possess. It is said to be 750 years of age, and is probably the oldest fire engine in the kingdom.

The death of Mr. Nugent Murray Whitmore Daniel, one of the few survivors of the Old East India Company, occurred recently at Tat-y-Bwlch, Merionethshire. Born in 1832, Mr. Daniel served in the Bombay presidency for twenty years, was at one time under secretary to the Government, and at the time of his retirement was serving as Judge at Ahmednagar. He married in 1859 Lady Agnes Knox, daughter of the third Earl of Ranfurly, who survives him.

A movement has been initiated which it is hoped may lead to the carrying out of an extensive scheme of internal waterways for Somerset and Devon. Some such scheme, which then aimed at connecting Bristol and Exeter by canal, was propounded many years ago, but nothing came of it, through the railway companies becoming too powerful. As the first step towards the realization of this idea it is now proposed to develop the Exeter Canal, which is the oldest ship canal in the kingdom.

A Yorkshire curate, aged 64, in office within a short distance of Leeds, has married the daughter of a workman at a foundry at his former parish, where he was the curate in charge. She is 18 years of age. She was formerly engaged at a factory, and became a teacher under the Leeds education authority, and was carefully educated at Leeds and Buxton for her future position in life. When the parties fell in love, two years ago,

she was engaged in Sunday school work.

A cyclist, riding from Taunton to Bath, Somerset, had an extraordinary experience. His machine passed over a snake three feet six inches long, the reptile becoming entangled in the spokes of the front wheel. The rider was brought down, and when he tried to extricate the snake the latter put out its venomous fangs and hissed spitefully. Eventually the reptile was dispatched, and the cyclist rode off with it on his machine, and is having it preserved as a reminder of his exciting experience.

Further discoveries of the Roman town of Corstophium, near Corbridge-on-Tyne, were mentioned at a meeting of the Newcastle Society of Antiquaries. Professor Laverfield, of Oxford, who presided, remarked that in his opinion they were the most important ever made in Britain. As for the Roman masonry, he had never seen such fine masonry, and there was ample evidence that the site was even larger and more important than had been supposed.

Australia, the land of oddities, animal, vegetable and mineral, has few more curious creatures than the giant cranes—often five and six feet in height, with beautiful blue-grey plumage—which are called native companions. These huge birds mate for life, and, as mates, are singularly and touchingly devoted to one another.

Successful objection has been made by the medical and scientific men of Berlin to the form of the proposed memorial to Virchow, which is not a statue of Virchow, but introduces as the chief group a symbolic representation of his lifework, in the form of a struggle between a giant and a fabulous beast, while on a pedestal a medallion portrait of Virchow is placed.

In the production of soft coal, Bohemia at present occupies the second place among the countries and principalities of Europe, Germany standing first. The total output of Bohemia, which was 942,836 tons in 1896, amounted to 20,075,330 tons in 1906, or an increase of twenty-fold. Of hard coal Bohemia furnished in 1906 a little over one-third of the whole production of Austria, its output amounting to 4,738,034 tons, of which 76.21 per cent were consumed in Bohemia itself.
