TWO REPRESENTATIVES FROM CITY COUNCIL

Civic Federation Committee Decide to Ask That These Be Appointed.

The committee appointed last winter to take the initiative in forming a civic federation in London met in the First Presbyterian Church, and after giving the subject the most careful consideration passed the following resolutions:

1. That the city council be asked to appoint two representatives to act with the above named committee.

2. That the Ministerial Alliance be asked to secure twelve men, representing the public; the board of trade, the business community, employers, and the Trades and Labor Council twelve men, representing labor.

3. That an outline of the plans and purposes of the civic federation be printed, and a copy sent to each of the above appointees.

4. That a meeting of all the representatives be called at a date in the early autumn.

5. That Rev. J. G. Inkster and Mr. Joseph T. Bunker be a committee to look after the press, printing and circulation.

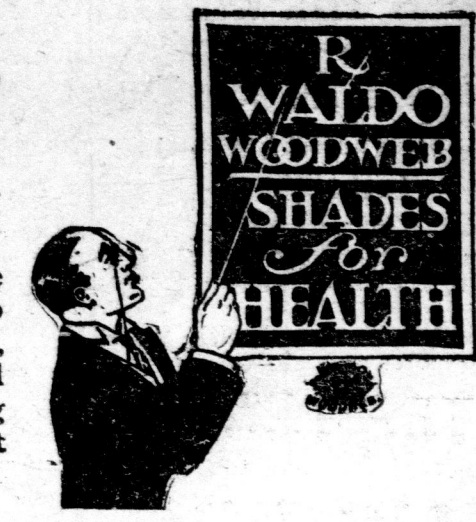

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., May 25.—Capt. McCoy, of the "Donkey" Fish Company's steamer Manitou, reported here today that Robert McMenney, lighthouse-keeper at Otter Head, and other mariners, who left several weeks ago in a small boat for Heron Bay to secure supplies, had returned to that place.

Capt. McCoy learned of their return from Capt. Jones of the fish tug "Alma", who says he saw McMenney lifting nets a short distance off Otter Head shore. A northeast gale came up after the man had left and as they were not heard from for two weeks, all hope for their safety had been dispelled.

Port Huron, Mich., May 25.—The home of Herbert Morrison, a marine engineer, was attacked by union engineers, who hurled rotten eggs, stones and other missiles at the doors and windows, breaking several panes of glass. Mrs. Morrison was alone with her children at the time, and for a time could not imagine what the disturbance on the outside was.

Going to the door she was met with a volley of aged hen fruit, and was forced to retreat. Despite her pleading the strikers kept pelting the building. Warrants may be issued.

Cook Under Arrest.

Detroit, May 26.—"Curly" Cunningham, of Detroit, and John Polities, of Cleveland, have been arrested at Cleveland on charges of assault. Cunningham is charged with having assaulted R. B. Bunker, May 20, and Polities is accused of having assaulted John M. Merringer, special officer in the employ of the Lake Carriers' Association, on May 15. Both cases are the outgrowth of the strike on the lakes.

"I know that Cunningham hails from Detroit," said Agent Pierce, of the local branch of the lake seamen's union, yesterday morning, "but haven't seen him this season. When he was in Detroit he was connected with the Aspen until relieved by late Bernier, who's union didn't know that he had been arrested."

Captain Promoted.

Capt. W. J. Lanstra, of the Government lighthouse tender Aspen, stationed at the Soo, has received telegraphic orders to proceed to Duluth to take charge of the tender Martingold covering the entire eleventh district from Detroit to Duluth. First Mate Brown will have charge of the Aspen until relieved by late Bernier, now on the Government steamer Anemone.

Sailor Dies of Fall.

Adam Roundulovic, a sailor on the steamer Geman, who was seriously injured by falling into the hold of the boat, is dead at the Soo as the result of his injuries. Nothing is known of his relatives, although he referred to a brother, Steve, in his conscious moments.

AN ARMY OF SOLDIERS DASH IN MOTOR CARS

Seven Hundred Troops Rushed From Leeds to Scarborough.

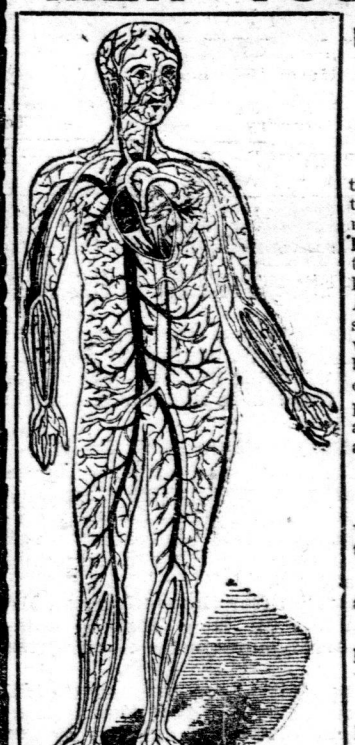
London, May 25.—Another experiment in automobilization, in connection with the territorial army took form of a dash by 700 troops to Scarborough from Leeds, a distance of 65 miles.

The idea was that the British navy having lost command of the sea, the invasion of England had begun. For- eign troops had landed at several points on the northeast coast, and raids were being made on different towns, including Scarborough. The Leeds Territorials resolve to go to the relief of the latter place, but as the Seventh battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment (Leeds Rifles), are about to entrain at Leeds intelligence is received that the invaders have cut the railway. A dash to Scarborough by motor car is thus resorted to.

As the Leeds Rifles are nearly 1,000 strong, at least 200 motor cars were required to carry the full strength of the battalion. The Yorkshire Automobile Association made a great effort to secure the loan of sufficient cars, but without success. The result was that over 200 men were unable to make the journey.

The invading force, represented by 900 regular troops from the Second Battalion, Yorkshire Regiment, a few members of the local territorial force as scouts and 23 men with two guns
