There is no reason to doubt the accuracy of these figures, but they do not prove the contention of the American commissioners. They are useless as a basis of comparison. Take the dutiable goods alone. The American tariff is so high that it absolutely excludes many ly farm products and manufactures. Consequently these play no part in the figures of American imports cited by Messrs. Pepper and Emery. A simple illustration will suffice. Suppose the American duty on Canadian barley were only 5 cents a bushel, and that ten million bushels were imported. Suppose the duty were raised to 30 cents a bushel (the rate actually fixed in 1897), and the importation was totally stopped thereby. Messrs. Pepper and Emery could point to the trade returns and say truthfully that no duty was collected by the United States upon Canadian barley.
