Association of New York, organized in

total abstainers, has been made insolvent

by the admission as policyholders of

"moderate drinkers," its officers

announced today. The state department

of insurance has taken charge of its

affairs. A notice posted on the door of

the main office here announces that

the company is insolvent.

A representative of the insurance

department said the concern owed

about \$80,000 in death claims, and

there were no funds to pay 1,000 or

more living policyholders.

Frank Belano, formerly president of

the association, said the largest financial

loss was due to a modification of the

principles as to what constituted moderate

users of intoxicating liquors to become

policyholders.

"The deaths in this class were 50

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## ROUMANIA EXPECTS EVEN REFUSES: STATE INSISTENCE: BERLIN'S FLAG

Thaw's Wife Does Not Want To Testify, But Suit Is Civil.

New York, July 6.—Evelyn Nesbit

Thaw, summoned by the state to testify

against Harry K. Thaw, her husband,

in the jury proceedings to determine his

mental condition, reached New York

today from her camp at Chateaugay

Lake, near Malone, N. Y., hurried to

the courtroom, and arriving there

announced that she would stand upon her

constitutional rights and would not take

the stand against her husband.

Mrs. Thaw made her statement to

newspapermen, and when Deputy Attorney

General Cook was informed of what

she had said, he asserted that, inasmuch

as the hearing was a civil proceeding

and not a criminal case, the court could

direct her to testify, and that he would

ask the court to so direct.

Mrs. Thaw's appearance did not bear

out reports to the effect that she was

suffering from nervous prostration. She

looked extremely well, was dressed in a

dark blue silk gown with white trim

and a white collar, and was wearing

with roses; and white kid gloves, edged

in black.
