cash registers and a few other fixtures.

to have it on hand in case of emer-
gency or to wet a dry palate. Next
week will find the license inspectors
on the job.

HOTEL RATES BOOSTED.

SARNIA, Sept. 17.—Local hotel
proprietors find it necessary to raise
their rates with the advent of pro-
hibition, and next week travelers will
be forced to "dig deeper" in their
money pockets to pay for accommoda-
tion. This step is necessary on account
of the decreased revenue, and while
no doubt many complaints will be regis-
tered, the hotel proprietors say it is
their only salvation.

MUST MAKE RESTITUTION.

SARNIA, Sept. 17.—Lizzie Quinn, who
was remanded from Thursday, appeared
before the court Saturday morning on a
charge of obtaining money on false
pretences, laid by H. Sanders, proprietor
of the Northern Hotel. In reply to an
advertisement in a newspaper, Miss
Quinn obtained work at the Northern
Hotel, and Mr. Sanders advanced her
\$4 to pay the cost of transportation.
The defendant duly arrived and started
work, but after being on the job about
a day and a half, took leave without
pay, and secured work on the steamer
Noric, on which she was arrested.
She stated that it was not her inten-
tion to defraud, but was willing to re-
fund the advance at first opportunity.

TEMPERATURE CHANGES
REDUCE LOCAL MARKETHay Fairly Plentiful, However, and
Goes Up in Price.The sudden cool spell prevented any
large attendance at the local market
today. Hay, however, was fairly
plentiful, and sold at \$12 to \$14
a ton. Straw was scarce and brought
\$7.50 to \$8.50. Wheat was steady at
\$1.87 to \$1.88 a cwt. Old wheat was of-
fered at \$12.10 a bushel.Potatoes were scarce and small in
size. Many imported ones were sold.
The home-grown variety brought \$1.65
a bushel. New cabbage was steady
at \$2.25 a bushel. Tomatoes were steady
at 30c to 35c a bushel. New cabbage
brought 50c to \$1 a dozen. Beets were
steady at 30c. New beans sold for 80c
a bushel. Plums sold for 25c to 30c a
bushel. Peaches were fairly plentiful,
the price being steady at 50c to 55c a
bushel. Cantaloupes, brought from \$1
to \$2.25 a dozen. Grapes were steady
at 25c to 30c a bushel.Butter was firm at 40c a pound for
creamery, and 35c a pound for dairy.
Eggs were a little higher at 32c a dozen,
wholesale, and 35c to 36c a dozen, retail.
Honey was steady at \$1.25 for retail.

off for October, 2c down for December,

Barley declined 1/4c. Flax was 1/4c up
for October and 1/2c lower for November
and 1/2c lower for December.
Small local and professional trade
sent prices lower today. Exports were
out of the market. The price got the
support of few exporters, and the bulk
of the commission houses for the
local crowd was all on the bear side.
yet there was so little wheat offered
that it was hard to break the price.
The hedging was all done in the morn-
ing.
Chicago, Sept. 18.—Decreasing stocks
at Liverpool and a bullish effect on
western receipts had a bullish effect on
wheat today. Besides, world supply
seemed more disposed than on Satur-
day to attach importance to European
demand near Black Sea. On the
other hand, Kansas City and Omaha
reported many cars of wheat car-
ried over from last week unsold.
Opening prices here, which ranged
from 1/4c decline to 1 1/2c advance, were
followed by material gains all around,
and then something of a reaction.
