

LONDON MAY HAVE A WOMAN CANDIDATE FOR DOMINION HOUSE

Mrs. Gordon Wright, President of the W. C. T. U., Is Prominently Mentioned.

That the forthcoming general elections for the Dominion Parliament will in all probability see London one of the constituencies in which a woman will ask the electors to place in her hands the power of expressing their will on matters of public interest was the substance of a very pronounced rumor on the streets Saturday and yesterday.

It was stated on good authority that the several women's organizations of the city will be asked to endorse a nominee of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in the person of Mrs. Gordon Wright as candidate in the forthcoming Dominion election.

Mrs. Wright, who as a sister of Hon. Newton W. Rowell, M.P., belongs to a family which has already had extensive and prominent political experience. As president of the National W. C. T. U., she is well known as an ardent prohibitionist and is greatly interested in the ending of secret trafficking in liquor. Her work on behalf of deceased soldiers' relatives by reason of her close connection with the "Associated Kin of Canada," of which her husband is president, has made her well known among Canadian veterans.

As a prominent member in the National Council of Women and as president of the W. C. T. U., she has traveled from coast to coast, giving addresses, organizing, and is well known throughout the Dominion as a leader of political aspirations amongst the women.

While declining at the present time to make any statement in regard to the truth or otherwise of the rumors, when asked yesterday by The Advertiser about the matter, Mrs. Wright did not deny that she had been asked to accept nomination by the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

LATE MISS McLARDY NATIVE OF FINGAL

The death took place on Saturday in this city of Miss Margaret McLardy, who was well known to residents of St. Thomas and Elgin County. The deceased was born at Fingal, her parents being the late Archibald and Barbara Sinclair McLardy. For some years she remained a resident of Fingal, later moving to St. Thomas. Later she moved to London, where she has been residing with her brother-in-law, Mr. Frank Adams. Her illness extended over some five weeks, but it was not thought to be of a serious nature. Heart-failure developed later. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and was always interested in the affairs of church and community. Her funeral will be held on Tuesday from the residence of Mr. Frank Adams, 409 King street, at 2 o'clock. Interment will be made in Fingal Cemetery. She leaves one sister, Miss Marie McLardy, to mourn her loss.

AUTO RACES WILL BE FEATURE OF FAIR PROGRAM SATURDAY

Seven Events Scheduled—Purses Amount to Over \$2,500.

Speed records are slated to go by the board, reputations for daring driving will be lost in the new daredevilry, and thousands of sport fans will have their appetites for thrills satisfied on Saturday afternoon, September 17, when half a score of professional racing kings battle for laurels as the feature attraction of the Western Fair.

Negotiations to bring some of the greatest drivers in the country to London have been completed by Secretary A. M. Hunt, who has obtained a sanction to hold professional auto racing events on the local track. Mr. Hunt has also succeeded in obtaining entries from several of the pilots who were entered in the Canadian National Exhibition races at Toronto and others who were at Detroit last week for the Michigan sweepstakes classic.

Seven Speed Events. Seven events will make up the racing program on Saturday, officials announce. Representatives of the International Motor Contest Association will be on hand to conduct the contests and to examine all cars and drivers before they are permitted to begin their mad whirl around the London oval.

Purses for the seven events will amount to more than \$2,500, not including the trophy cups and special prizes to be offered by various manufacturers of automobile accessories. The tempting prizes have attracted entries from veteran stars, who promise to provide plenty of thrills on Automobile Day.

One of the big events on the afternoon program will be the time trials, when every driver will be given an opportunity to try for new records. Officials announce that a special purse will be offered for this event.

LONDON TAKES LEAD IN BOYS' ACTIVITIES

Membership Is Already Well Over 1,000 and Still Growing.

In the official program of the Protestant Sunday schools in Canada for the boys taking up club activities such as speeches, debates, basketball and base-ball leagues, hockey, inter-church leagues, father and son, and mother and son week, and other work, London holds the record of taking up more of this work than any other city in the Dominion.

Last year, 26 Tuxis and 24 Trail Ranger clubs were formed in this city, with a total membership of over one thousand members, and this number will, it is expected, be greatly surpassed this year. The clubs are made up of boys ranging in age from 12 to 20 years, and the main object is to bring out the intellectual, physical, devotional and social aspirations of the boys, and developing the highest type of Christian citizenship.

The Y. M. C. A. supplies the organizations with leadership and budget, to carry on the work in the city. Last year the "Y" had 85 men engaged with this work, and this year expects to have at least 100.

The standard program is carried on in the Sunday schools, and when this is not convenient, it is carried on in the Y.

The Boys' Club of the Talbot Street Baptist Church met in their clubrooms Sunday afternoon to discuss their fall and winter program, and F. S. Huggell and Stanley Howard were appointed as leaders of their activities.

GIANT PAYS VISIT TO ADVERTISER OFFICE

Jan Van Albert, 19-year-old Holland giant, accompanied by his manager, L. Rose, visited The Advertiser office this morning. He is 9 feet 5 inches in height. Mr. Van Albert, who is one of the Western Fair attractions, weighs 320 pounds, although of very slim build. At 7 years of age he was 6 feet tall. Within the past year he has added 14 inches to his height, and says he is still growing. His parents, four sisters and two brothers, in Amsterdam, Holland, are all of normal height.

Three weeks ago he was married to a little girl who is about 5 feet 6 inches in height. At Toronto Exhibition, 100,000 people paid admission to see him, and in 22 months he states he made \$72,000.

CHICAGO POLICE CLAIM CERTAIN DISCREPANCIES IN YOUTH'S CONFESSION

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Authorities investigating the late murder of Bertha J. Daugherty, automobile salesman, and Carl Ausmus, his companion, today were attempting to sift the facts from two alleged confessions made by Harvey W. Church yesterday.

In one confession, according to the police, Church admitted committing both murders single-handed. In a second and informal confession, the police say, he asserted he had accomplices in the crimes.

It was announced today that in investigating the late statements, two new arrests had been made, search for a dozen former associates of Church was under way, and Church's parents were today to be subjected to questioning.

Investigators today pointed out that Church himself could hardly have handled the body of Daugherty weighing 220 pounds, when he weighed but 135, and that Church in his first confession referred several times to "we."

FOOD LEVIES IMPOSED BY REDS RESULT IN UPRISING OF PEASANTS

London, Sept. 12.—White Russia is the scene of an insurrection against the soviet authorities, says a Warsaw dispatch to the Financial Mail. The trouble began, it is said, as a result of forcible food levies by the Bolsheviks. The inhabitants of this section of Russia fought to protect their supplies, and the insurrection is declared to be spreading. Bolshevik commissaries are being constantly murdered, the dispatch declares, and the soviet authorities are fighting the insurrection by all possible means, there being a number of mass executions reported.

NEW RECORDS MADE BY FAIR ATTENDANCE

Toronto, Sept. 11.—The attendance at the Canadian National Exhibition which closed on Saturday was 1,242,000, which establishes a new record, the highest previous year having been in 1915, when 1,201,000 persons attended. The Prince of Wales attracted a large crowd on that occasion.

Announcement that Count d'Arnaud, head of the French mission in charge of the "made-in-France" train, would recommend to the French Government the erection of a permanent French building at the Canadian National Exhibition, was made by President Fleming at the Canadian National luncheon on Saturday. A structure to cost \$100,000 had been suggested by Count d'Arnaud.

GERMAN MARK SLUMPS.

London, Sept. 12.—The value of the German mark fell today to 39 1/2 marks the pound sterling. This is a new low record for the mark here.

1,000 NEGROES HOMELESS.

Bryan, Texas, Sept. 12.—About 1,000 negroes are homeless through a flood in the Brazos River bottoms fifteen miles south of Bryan. No reports of loss of life have been received. Thousands of bales of cotton are estimated to have been washed away, and many cattle, horses and mules are lost.
