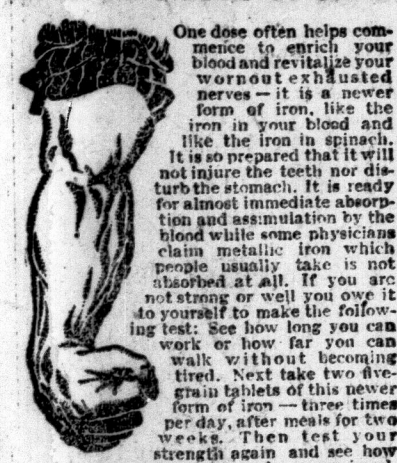

**ADMITTS SHIPPERS CONFER TO AGREE ON FREIGHT RATES**

Steamship Manager Tells Special Committee of Working Agreement.

**AIM TO MAKE MONEY**

Major Currie Explains Companies Meet To Protect Interests in Trade.

Canadian Press Despatch.

Ottawa, March 16.—That there was a system of regular meetings of representatives of the steamship companies at Montreal, at which the companies on various farm products were decided upon as between the companies, was admitted by Major Philip Currie, general manager at Montreal of the White Star Dominion Steamship line, in his evidence before the special house committee yesterday. Witness said the rate on livestock from Montreal to Liverpool would be about \$22.50, when Montreal sailings opened. At present the rate from Portland is \$20. Witness was subjected to a great deal of questioning as to the hands of the chairman, A. R. McMaster, and stated that there were "understandings" between the competing companies as to freight rates on certain classes of farm produce and "gentlemen's agreements" on other commodities.

Do you think the large volume of cattle moving will have a tendency to increase the rate? asked T. Sales (Progressive, Saltcoats). Witness admitted the rate might go to \$25 per head. "Is there any justification for that increase?" Mr. Sales asked. After the money. "We are trying to make money with our ships," witness replied. "If the trade would stand the increase it might be made." "Would it be a mere coincidence if a shipper steamship companies" asked Mr. McMaster. Witness said this would indicate that \$22.50 was a fair market rate. The steamship companies had recently conferred on the matter of cattle rates and shipping conditions. If rates were much lower many ships would leave the service, witness stated. Companies would not operate at a loss. Mr. McMaster asked if it was true that American mail flour was given a preference over Canadian flour in ocean rates of from two to five cents per 100 pounds. Witness said this was quite possible. Flour rates from Montreal were 19 cents and American flour rates from New York 15 cents.

**Carried Little Flour.**

Mr. McMaster asked if this discrimination did not also apply from Canadian ports. Witness said his company carried but little flour and he could not speak for New York. "As far as we are concerned we would not take American flour cheaper than Canadian," said witness.

Butter rates said Mr. Currie, were \$1.40 per 100 pounds. This rate had been decided on at a meeting of the steamship companies' representatives in Montreal.

"Are these conferences not held to avoid rate competition between the companies?" Mr. McMaster asked. Witness said he did not know enough about the matter to answer.

**DIVERS COMPLAINTS ARE HEARD BY COURT**

London West Citizens Appeal Against Nature of Property Assessment.

The court of revision had an exceedingly busy day at the same time, sitting yesterday afternoon, when between 25 and 30 residents of London West appeared before the board to complain of everything from the city officials adding an imaginary ten or fifteen feet to the length of their lots on the assessment notices, to the assessments being "simply disgraceful" or "twice too much."

In some cases it was found that owners had been made, while in others the property owners had signed agreements with the city, whereby they were to be exempt from sewer tax for a year or more. One of the most common grievances brought before the court was the assessment of corner lots. On account of the long frontage on two streets it has been the custom to allow a proportionate number of feet facing on one of the streets to "ride free" from taxes, but even with exemptions, many thought that the assessments were too high. The court ruled, however, that they had no power to act in such cases.

**Council Was Present.**

In some instances the complaining parties had engaged lawyers to state the facts plainly and simply before the court. Many of the cases were indeed intricate enough for any court, and the board members were puzzled. A few times as to just what the nature of the complaint.

A few declared that they did not have a chance to protest the building of a sewer on the street on which they owned lots, or they would have done so. These claimed that the building of a sewer had boosted the tax on the property to such an extent that it was unobtainable. One man stated that he could not give his lot away because of the sewer. The taxes charged by the city.

**Was Holding Land.**

One man complained of the amount of the assessment on a piece of property, because he had entered into an agreement with the city not to build houses, as in some future time the city authorities might decide to open a new street through the property. The court will hold a session at 7:30 tonight to consider cases involving income tax, statute labor and any appeals except those on local improvements.

**Labor Leader Makes Self At Home As Guest of King**

Ramsay MacDonald Dines With English Monarch For Second Time Within Fortnight and Enjoys Function.

London, March 16.—For the second time within a fortnight J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the Labor party, tonight dined with royalty, this time at Buckingham Palace, whither he, along with the leaders of the various parties and their wives and prominent society folks, was bidden to break bread with the king and queen. The dinner was of a semi-state character. Forty-one guests were seated at a number of round tables; the stewards and footmen-in-waiting wore scarlet coats with gold epaulettes, knee breeches, white hose and low shoes and powdered hair. The band of the Irish Guards played during and after the dinner.

From the point of view of some sections of the Labor party, dining with their majesties is becoming quite a habit with Mr. MacDonald, who, judging from the savoir faire with which he mingled with the king's guests, seems rather to enjoy his new social position.

**MacDonald Only Labor Guest.**

Through some confusion the impression had been circulated that the same Labor members of the House who dined with the king and queen a few days ago at Windsor in tonight's list of guests, but later it was learned that Ramsay MacDonald was the only Laborite invited to this function at Buckingham Palace.

The casual manner in which Mr. MacDonald viewed the second chance

to rub elbows with royalty may be judged from the fact that he was still in the House of Commons, holding a conference with his associates, less than an hour before the time set for the assembly of the guests at the palace. Despite the seeming lack of time, however, Mr. MacDonald was not numbered among the tardy arrivals, who drove to the palace either in limousines or their own automobiles through a cold, penetrating drizzle, which to the ordinary passerby gave the staid grounds an austere, forbidding appearance, in vivid contrast to the colorful warmth which marked the festive interior.

**Elaborate Service.**

The banquet was served in the state dining-room and the celebrated court service of green Sevres was used for the first time in London. The master of the household, who is considered an artist of skill in color schemes and table decorations, entrusted to the court florists the task of matching the formal decorations to conform with the green Sevres service and the gold candelabra.

The florist selected orange tulips, mimosa and yellow Marguerites of a very pale shade. Thus the color scheme showed a variation from deep orange to pale yellow which toned perfectly with the green and gold. Among the guests were Premier Bonar Law, the Duke of Devonshire, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd George, the Earl and Countess of Dartmouth and Viscount and Lady Astor.

**RECOMMEND RUSHING NEW REGISTRY OFFICE**

Special City Council Committee Urges Immediate Start On Building.

After a brief conference last night the members of a special committee of the city council recommended that the construction of a new registry office be undertaken as speedily as possible.

The councillors named a certain estimate figure, which they request should not be made public until a definite ruling is voted Monday night next. It is freely acknowledged, however, that the lowest tested, that of Hyatt Bros. \$65,000, has been substantially reduced.

**NON-JEWISH GROUPS WIN MAJORITY IN PALESTINE**

Jerusalem, March 15.—Official figures of the results of the primary elections in Palestine show 93 Jews, 126 Moslems, 22 Christians and 8 of other sects were chosen to the electoral college. Of this total of 249 the non-Jewish groups will have a margin of 63. Owing to the Arab boycott of the elections there are still vacancies in the electoral college.

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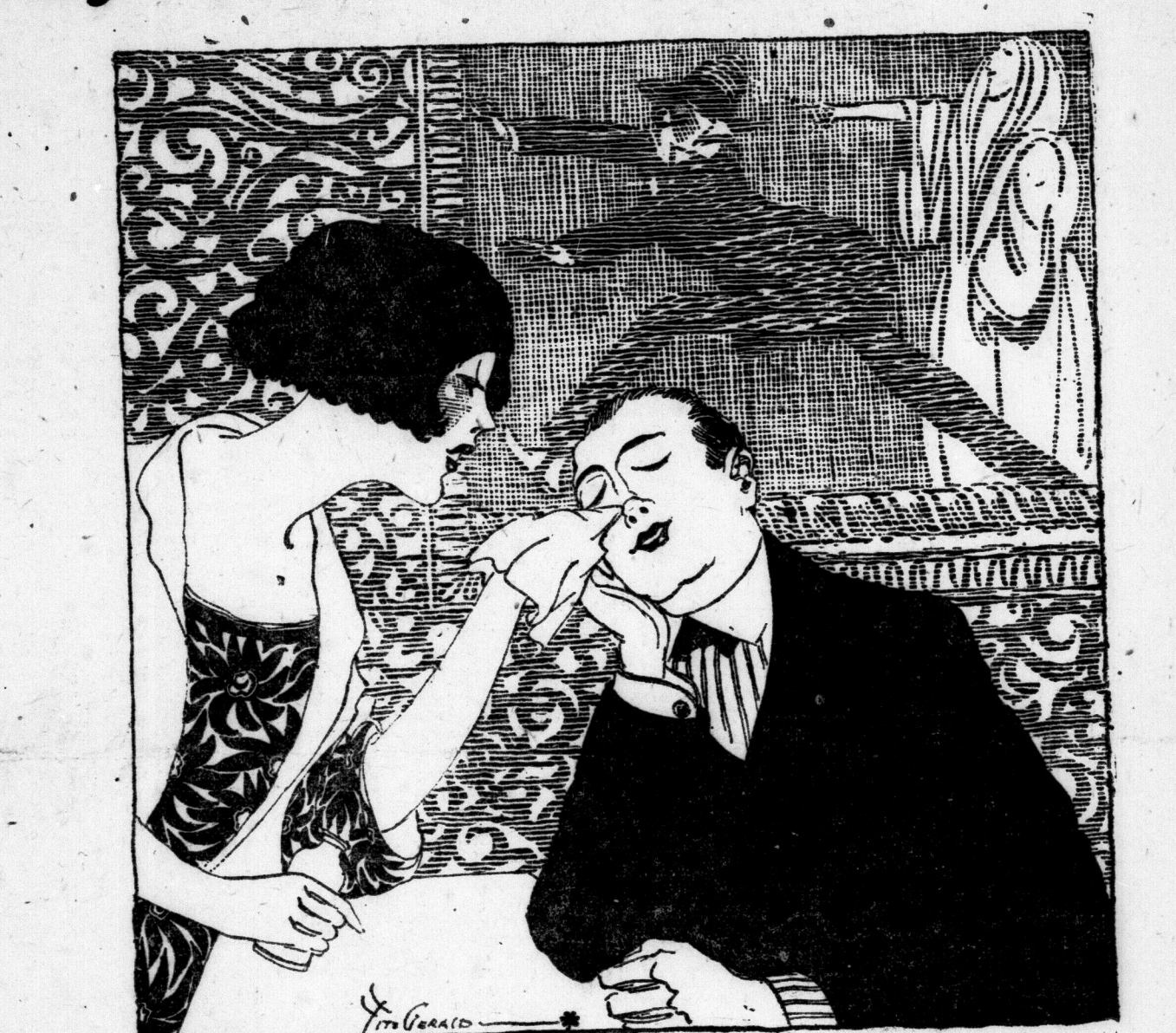
