# New York, April 27.—The raw sugar market was a shade lower early today, with Cubas now quoted at 6%c, cost and freight, equal to 8.4ic for centrifugal. There were sales of 10,000 bags of Cubas by an operator to a refiner at quoted prices, although first hands seemed to be holding at 6%c, cost and freight. There was also a sale of 2,500 tons of Cubas to Chile at 6.69c, f.o.b. Cuba, equal to about 3.32c above 6%c, cost and freight, here. The raw sugar futures market opened 1 to 2 points lower under continued liquidation. Prices at midday were 5 to 7 points net higher. There was no improvement in the demand for refined sugar, and prices were unchanged, at \$10.05 to \$10.25 for fine granulated. Refined futures were nominal. WHOLESALE BUSINESS SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Bylaw No. 6935

Assessment Commissioner Statutory Declarations, as required by Section 19a of the Assessment Act. BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of London, as follows:

1. Every person in receipt of an income liable to assessment in the said City of London shall, on or before the thirtieth day of April in each year, forward to the Assessment Commissioner of the City of London a Statutory Declaration, according to the form referred to in sub-section 12 of Section 18 of the Assessment Act, showing his total income from all sources during the past year, as required by said Section 192 of the Assessment Act, provided, however, that this section shall not apply to persons who have made a return to the assessor or assessment commissioner upon request, as provided by said Section 18 of the Assessment Act.

2. Any person convicted of a breach BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by

Act.

2. Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this bylaw shall forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the convicting Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding (exclusive of costs), the sum of Fifty Dollars for each offence; and in default of payment of said penalty and costs, or costs only, may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender; and in case of there being no distress found out of which such penalty can be levied, the convicting Magistrate may commit the offender to the Common Jail of the County of Middlesex, with or without hard labor, for any period not exceeding six calender months, unless the said penalty and costs (if any), including the costs of the said distress and of the committal and conveyance of the offender to the said jail are sconer paid.
