Address Will Be Given in
Support of Ontario
Temperance.

Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell, K.C., Toronto, and Harold Barrum, K.C., Alton, have been secured by the London temperance campaign committee to address a public mass meeting in the Capitol Theatre Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Rowell, formerly president of the privy council, and former leader of the Liberal party in the provincial legislature, needs no introduction to London audiences. For several years past he has definitely allied himself on the side of the temperance forces, originating the "Abolish the bar" campaign in September, 1916.

Mr. Barrum is vice-president of the Western Ontario Conservative association and is a fluent speaker.

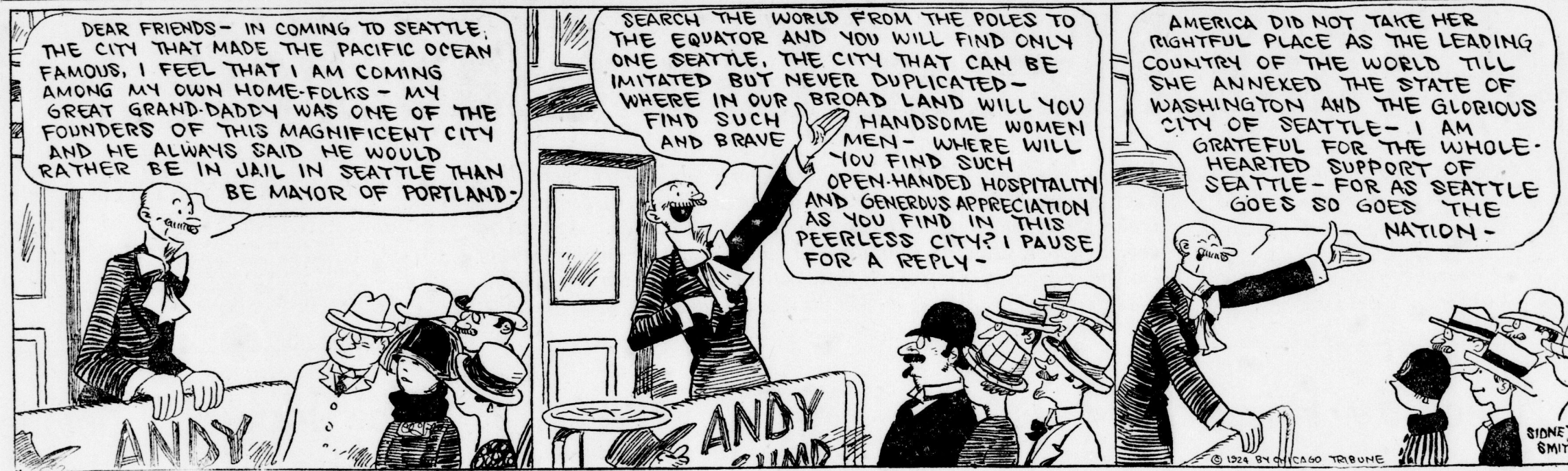

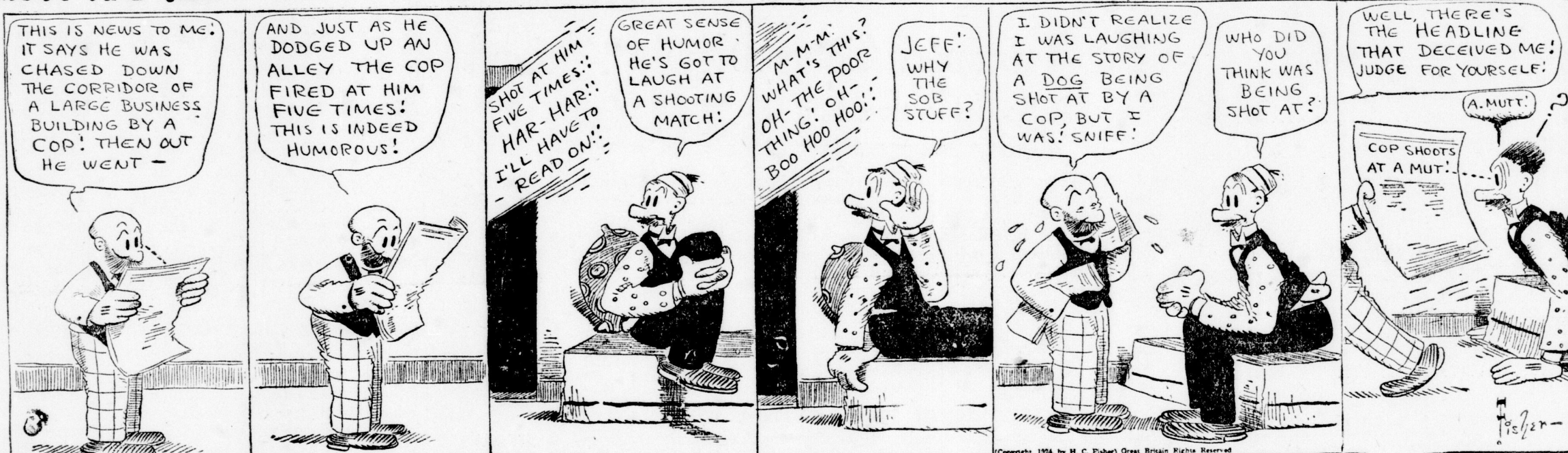

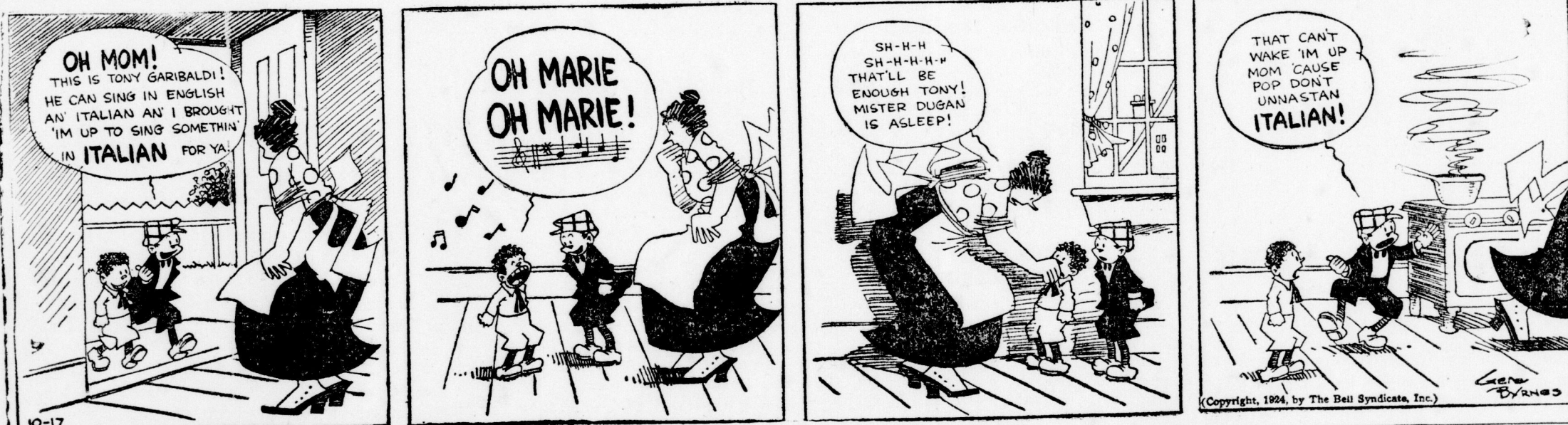
