West London Gets Pament If Street Railway Acts

HOGS BURN TO ATONE FOR ACT

Leader of Religious Body Outlines Reason For Wingham Farmer's Action.

PORK IS FORBIDDEN

Claim Literal Translation of Words Contained in Bible.

Wingham, March 10.—Anna Reynolds, self-styled faith healer, who last Thursday ordered a follower of her religious sect, Earl Underwood of Bluevale, to kill and burn ten hogs as a sacrificial offering, will not appear in court on the charge of being insane and dangerous to be at large until one week today. Her case was adjourned by Magistrate Reid of Goderich this afternoon. She was scheduled to appear before the court at 1:30 this afternoon. The burning of ten hogs on a huge pile at the Underwood farm near here has attracted wide attention. Hundreds were present in court today to catch a glimpse of the woman and many were turned away.

The adjournment was granted upon the request of Provincial Officer A. Whitesides of Hensall, who intends to visit the Underwood farm this afternoon to investigate. Mrs. Reynolds declares that the burnt offering of last Thursday was partly responsible for her week's remand. "Faith, too," she said, "would gain for her, her freedom. The woman was given her freedom on \$1,000 bail."

ATONES FOR HOGS.

Toronto, March 10.—Akin to the sacrifices of ancient Israel in the picturesque ritual with which it was carried out, Earl Underwood's destruction of his ten hogs at Wingham to save his sick wife was in reality an act of obedience and atonement for the offence of rearing forbidden food.

This explanation was given to The Advertiser today by Rev. O. E. Crookford, founder of the Cedarvale avenue gospel tabernacle, of which Underwood is a member. Underwood accepts literally the old testament proscription of pork. Though he does not eat the flesh of hogs, he had, even since his conversion to his present beliefs, kept his swine for sale.

Threat of Punishment.
When his wife's condition became serious following the birth of her baby, he concluded that it was this compromise with the principles of his faith that had brought down the wrath of divine punishment on his home. In a letter that reached Toronto this morning he explains this to Mr. Crookford and says that he now accepts literally the old testament proscription of pork. Though he does not eat the flesh of hogs, he had, even since his conversion to his present beliefs, kept his swine for sale.

SENSATION SEEKERS THROG COURT AT DENNISTOUN TRIAL

Boy Hears Plans For His Funeral

Adisonville, Ky., March 10.

All his faculties paralyzed following a fracture of the skull, suffered when he fell while skating, 9-year-old Roscoe Qualle lay helplessly in bed here Sunday and heard his parents plan funeral arrangements after giving him up for dead.

When a physician was called Roscoe was declared "quite alive," and today was sitting up in bed after hours of distraction at the thought of being buried alive.

ROTHERMERE CHARGED WITH DODGING EXAMS

Peer's Challenger Maintains Conditions Inserted Make Test of No Importance.

London, March 10.—Lord Rothermere's "schoolboy" examination seems hanging fire. Nothing has been heard about it for days, and now it is revealed that Lord Haldane declined to pass upon the questions framed by W. G. Cove, the peer's challenger, believing a more suitable umpire could be found.

Rothermere thereupon wrote Mr. Cove saying: "If you still wish to pursue the matter, the proposed questions must be submitted to Harold Cox, who will decide whether they are in accordance with the terms of the challenge."

Mr. Cove accuses Lord Rothermere of running away, and says that at their previous discussion he made clear that he would not, under any circumstances, accept Mr. Cox as umpire. The latter was the examiner of the boys applying for a position with Lord Rothermere's Daily Mail, whose ignorance appalled the publisher and led to his challenge by Mr. Cove, who is an ardent champion of the London school system.

BRIAND TO URGE TEST OF SECURITY PROTOCOL

Paris, March 10.—Premier Briand, who is representing France at the present meeting of the league of nations council at Geneva, will stand for application of the security protocol adopted by the league assembly last September. It was said today in official circles.

He will declare that security is a matter affecting all countries and that all must participate in the measures necessary to assure it.

GRAVE CHARGE MADE

London, March 10.—Hours before the resumption of the Dennistoun trial today a long queue of sensation-seeking persons, including more than two score women, waited outside the doors of the law courts. Some had equipped themselves with blankets and flasks of hot tea, for the day was bitterly cold.

When the doors were opened there was a concerted rush and the ushers had a hard time maintaining order. Many, including some members of the ultra-fashionable set, were turned away.

Mrs. Dennistoun is suing her former husband, now the husband of Mrs. Edward Marshall Hall, defence counsel, in cross-examining Sir George Lewis, Mrs. Dennistoun's solicitor, who was called as a witness, attacked the validity of the divorce granted to the Dennistouns in Paris in 1921 on the ground that it was collusive and that neither party was domiciled in France. The witness insisted that Colonel Dennistoun lived in France when the divorce was granted and that he would have remained there had he not been domiciled in Canada.

Mrs. Dennistoun, who went to the country over the week-end on the advice of her physician, appeared in court looking pale and not well. Neither Colonel Dennistoun nor his wife was present during the early proceedings.

SENATE REFORM TALK FAVORED BY LIBERALS

Provinces and Dominion To Discuss Amendment to B. N. A. Act.

Ottawa, March 9.—The division in the house of commons last night, resulting in a conference between the provinces and the dominion to consider amending the British North America act respecting the powers of the senate, found all the government members in favor of the principle that "the senate as it is at present constituted is not of the greatest advantage to Canada."

With the government members voted all the Progressive members but eleven, and one Conservative, W. F. McLean, York. The Progressive members voting against the motion were Messrs. Fancher, Gardner, Thurston, Hodgins, Campbell, Bird, Drummond, Kennedy, Ward, Black and Findlay. The result was 120 for and 30 against.

JOHN J. GARLAND DIES.

UNIONISTS AND ANTIS PREPARE

Both Church Bills Will Come Before Legislature Committee Next Tuesday.

STRUGGLE FORESEEN

West Lambton Member Wants Opposing Forces Advised Before Appearance.

Toronto, March 10.—The church bills will come before the private bills committee of the legislature at 9:30 next Tuesday morning, when the union and anti-union forces will appear. Attorney-General Nickle today stated that G. W. Mason, K.C., on one side and D. L. McCarthy, K.C., on the other, had agreed in regard to this, each had made a request for 35 or 40 tickets to distribute among people particularly interested. Mr. Mason and Mr. McCarthy will place before the committee their idea or understanding of the measures and their reasons why they should or should not pass. The hope was both bills would be before the committee at the same time. The proceedings will take place in the reception room.

In reply to a question, the attorney-general stated he imagined the union bill would come up first. It was the bill before the house last year and he would be inclined to call it first.

W. S. Haney, West Lambton—"Are these forces making any honest effort to arrive at an understanding before the bills come up?"

Attorney-General Nickle—"I think both sides are making an honest effort to get together, but I am rather inclined to the conclusion they are not."

TAKES SECRET TO HIS GRAVE
Beaver Island's Man of Mystery Believed To Have Been Russian Nobleman.

St. James, Beaver Island, Mich., March 10.—Beaver island's "man of mystery" is dead. When he is buried today he will take with him the secret of his identity which he has preserved for the fifty years he has lived here.

The man, known only as "Dr. Protar," was believed to have been a Russian nobleman in exile. Up to the time of the world war he received a remittance from Russia, which ceased about 1918.

"Protar" was called "doctor" because he frequently went about the island ministering to the sick, although he never accepted payments for his services and always made it clear he was not a graduate physician.

FRIENDS REVEAL IDENTITY.

Rock Island, Ill., March 10.—"Dr. Protar," who is dead at Beaver Island, near St. James, where he was known as a "man of mystery," was Baron Petrol of Pietri, Russia, friends here declared. He lived here from 1881 to 1893. He was graduated with a doctor's degree from the University of Dresden, Germany.

Close friends here believe he refused to accept any allowance from the Russian noble family, of which he was a member, having become a citizen of the United States under the name of Feodor Protar. He was born on the family estate in Orel, Russia, May 1, 1833, and came to this country as a leading man and stage manager of the English-speaking repertoire company of Fanny Gauscheck, a Bohemian actress.

KELLOGG WILL GET POST ON WAR DEBT COMMISSION

TWO BOYS ARE KILLED WHEN HIT BY LOCOMOTIVE

PLANS DRAFTED FOR HAIG VISIT

Famous British Field Marshal To Arrive in Ottawa July 17.

TO ATTEND CONVENTION

Ottawa, March 10.—Preliminary plans for the visit to Ottawa this summer of Field Marshal Earl Haig and the delegates to the convention of the British empire service league were announced at a general meeting of the local command, great war veterans' association last night. Earl Haig is expected here July 17 and 18. The dominion convention of the great war veterans' association will be held here at the same time, as that of the British empire service league.

Earl Haig will spend two weeks in Canada and has already expressed a desire to visit Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg, and other large centers. It has been decided to hold a general rally of all ex-service men in Ottawa for the purpose of greeting Earl Haig and his brother delegates. The governor-general and Sir Arthur Currie are to be consulted before final plans for his entertainment are completed.

CAB DRIVER GETS 20 YEARS FOR BROOKLYN MURDER

MILK WAR IN CITY BOOSTS SUPPLY OF RAW PRODUCT

London Health Authorities Issue Warning to Firms on Action.

REVERSE LABELS

Companies Within Law, But Must Not Misrepresent Product.

An increased supply of raw milk is going into London homes, coincident with the war being waged amongst the dealers of the dairy product. Where only a small percentage of unpasteurized milk was sold before, much more is being vended now to permit lower prices.

Action will be taken by city health authorities to prevent raw milk from being sold without proper advertisement. There is no bylaw against selling this milk, except that it is likely to be accepted as the pasteurized product. Authorities want to prevent any such misleading impression.

"B" milk is the classification given the pasteurized kind. Raw milk is indicated as "A" milk. Dealers simply invert the "B" caps when selling unpasteurized milk, and in a few cases leave the "B" advertisement unremoved.

Much trouble has been given health departments since the milk war opened and careful watch is being kept in order to prevent inferior milk from finding its way into the city during the battle of prices.

London Presbytery Clerk Is Charged By McIntosh With Twisting Minutes

Work of Rev. John McNair, D. D., Opens Hot Debate at Regular Meeting.

MINISTER RESIGNS

Rev. John Richardson Will Leave Chalmers as Soon as Arrangements Made.

The repose of the London presbytery was twice shattered this morning at its regular bi-monthly meeting in First Presbyterian church.

It was shattered first by Rev. W. R. McIntosh, D.D., King street church, who questioned "the partisan manner" in which Rev. John McNair, D.D., clerk of the presbytery, recorded the minutes of the court.

It was shattered in the second place by Rev. John Richardson, B.A., who tabled his resignation as pastor of Chalmers Presbyterian church, London, to take effect as soon as possible.

Mr. Richardson explained that he was resigning his intention to stay with Chalmers congregation, which had voted non-concurrence on church union, until June 10, he himself being in favor of union, but that he had finally found it impossible to continue even until that date.

It was stated by Mr. Richardson that after a joint consultation between the finance board and session of the church concerning the "seriously impaired" condition of the finances arising out of the split in the congregation he had been quickly requested to resign.

In resigning, Mr. Richardson urged that his resignation be accepted by the presbytery and acted upon as soon as possible.

A motion to have a committee of presbytery investigate the situation was withdrawn and an amendment, proposed by Rev. William Easton, D.D., and Rev. D. C. MacGregor, D.D., that the regular procedure as to resignations be followed, was adopted by the meeting.

Accordingly Chalmers congregation will be cited and a pro rata meeting of presbytery held on Monday, March 23, to consider the resignation and take action upon it.

When the moderator of the presbytery, Rev. T. A. Symington, M.A., Knox church, London, asked for a motion approving of the minutes, Dr. McIntosh rose to register his disapproval of the manner in which they had been recorded.

Dr. McIntosh asserted that Dr. McNair had "twisted and turned about" the minutes at every possible turn to become "anti-union propaganda." He charged that Dr. McNair had been a "unfair and biased" and maintained that the minutes of the presbytery, being of an official nature, should record the facts of the proceedings, not only what was favorable to the clerk.

GREAT BRITAIN TO ADOPT DAYLIGHT-SAVING TIME

London, March 10.—The mother country will have daylight saving time as a permanent institution.

Sir William Johnson-Pickers, secretary of state for home affairs, announced in the house of commons last night that the government would support a measure fixing summer time as a permanent law from April 1 to October 31 yearly.

The government's approval assures the measure of a clear passage.

CREW OF TUG BOAT DROWNED ON WAY TO SHIP'S DRAWS

Amsterdam, March 10.—Eight members of the crew of a tugboat sent to the aid of the Dutch steamer Soerakarta, which went ashore yesterday near the north pier, were drowned when the tug also stranded in a heavy sea.

Lifboats have landed 48 of the Soerakarta's crew, but the captain and other officers were still aboard early this morning.

The Soerakarta is a cargo steamer of 4,351 tons.

WEST END PAVEMENT SOUGHT

Dundas and Wardencliff Will Be Fixed If Street Railway Acts.

PETITION DENIED

Need of District Pointed to as Greatest in the City at Present.

West Londoners will benefit by more than \$100,000 worth of new paving in 1925, if the street railway company completes a provisional agreement concerning the five-cent rate of fares. At tonight's session of No. 2 committee, City Engineer W. P. Near will present a program of work for the year and included in this will be nearly a mile of new paving for West London.

The street railway's share will be \$40,000 and will be carried out, according to plans, on Dundas street west and Wardencliff road north. This sum will eat up most of the \$75,000 concession which the city council hopes to get from the company in return for permission to continue the five-cent rate of fares.

Three years ago West London ratepayers petitioned for new pavement for their main streets. No action was secured, because of failure of the street railway to enter into an agreement. The petition was temporarily shelved. Now, under the \$75,000 proposal made to the city council, it is expected that West London will come first.

"The company should be asked to pave West London first," Ald. Harry Buttrill, chairman of No. 2 committee, said today. "That's where the pavement is needed most. But, just the same, the city should ask the company to do more than that. Mr. Tait said that the company had a \$85,000 program. I don't see why the council couldn't go after them for all of that."

Strangely enough none of the West London aldermanic representatives voted in council for the program of fare agreement, even though they will likely get more pavement in that part of the city.

PREPARES PLANS.

Mr. Near is busy this afternoon completing his tentative program of works for the year. He has gone over the street railway problem and states that if the company is ready to do its share, the city can complete a very extensive paving bill this year.

Besides West London, the company is already working on a program on Dundas street east, between Lyle and Rectory, and on York street. This work is needed from an efficient standpoint, but it is not on the pavement is old and worn out and new pavements entirely are needed.

\$125,000 FIRE FOLLOWS OIL TANKS' EXPLOSION
Conflagration at Everett, Mass., Destroys 50,000 Gallons of Oil.

Everett, Mass., March 10.—Fire from an undetermined cause exploded four tanks of the Beacon Oil Company plant here last night, caused damage estimated at \$125,000, and sent up a column of black smoke until 7:15 this morning. Over 50,000 gallons of oil were destroyed.

Mrs. Katharine Carter, an invalid in a nearby tenement, was thrown from her bed by the explosion and suffered bruises and shock. The works of the oil company were turned into a blazing torch, which was visible for miles.

CAMPAIGN IS LAUNCHED AGAINST ALL ORIENTALS

BILL TO RESTRICT INTEREST ON LOANS TABLED IN BRITAIN

London, March 9.—A bill amending the law relating to money lending was tabled in the house of commons tonight by a group of private members representing all parties. It proposes to limit the rate of interest to 20 per cent and its restrictions include the prohibition of money lending advertisements and the distribution of circulars dealing with loans.
