WORLD WELCOMES BACK RITUAL OF SPANKING

Fifteen Hundred Delegates Hear Pronouncement on Corporal Punishment With Surprise.

PARENTS AT PARLEY
Less Friendly View Toward Spanking Is Held by London Home and School Leaders.

New York, Oct. 28.—The ritual of spanking was welcomed back into the world of approved procedure yesterday when Dr. William Kilpatrick, professor of philosophy of education at Teachers' college, gave it the seal of his approval before the modern parenthood conference here.

While favoring corporal punishment only in extreme circumstances, Mrs. Rose is not inclined to have around the house, she said, a child who is not obedient.

She emphasized the powers given the teacher in discipline as being those of a wise and just parent.

ARAB COMMITTEE PROTESTS.

DR. AMVOT TO PROBE NEW CURE

Dominion Health Official Will Investigate Claims Made For "Issin."

ASSISTANCE IS LIKELY

Workers in Local Laboratory To Receive Federal Aid, Is Belief.

Convinced of the value of the cancer research work of Dr. W. T. Galbraith and associates, and that issin may be the long-sought serum to kill the germ of the dread disease, Dr. J. A. Amvot, deputy-minister of the department of health, Ottawa, accompanied by a cancer specialist from the department, will visit London in the near future.

Considerable of the data collected by Dr. Galbraith and associates has been forwarded to Ottawa, and has been favorably received there. Dr. Amvot wishes to make a personal investigation prior to the extension of federal financial aid to the workers in the local laboratory.

While the reception accorded issin by the Canadian medical profession has been marked by skepticism, such is not the case in England. Several reputable medical journals have published articles on it, and have called for further information. Several of the associates who assisted the famous Dr. Galbraith himself has received an invitation to proceed to England, to his laboratory, and to the British medical association, and then proceed with his work.

It is very likely that the office will be accepted. Immediate success has prevented the speeding up of the work at the Byron laboratory.

LAWRASON TO CONTEST CITY BY-ELECTION

Leader in White's Campaign to Seek Conservative Nomination Later.

London is likely to be plunged into another political campaign within a few weeks. The provincial riding is now with the member, owing to the resignation of Sir Adam Beck, and already names are being mentioned in Conservative circles as to the man most likely to be nominated.

The Advertiser was informed today that S. F. Lawrason, who has been in charge of Mr. White's campaign since the resignation of E. S. Little, is likely to be the next candidate for the provincial seat.

It is said that Mr. Lawrason would devote his time to supervising the election and the development of the extension program now under way at the London Rolling Mills.

Meighen's Last Promise Is Jump In Food Prices

Offers High Tariff to Farmer—If Effective It Means Higher Prices to City People on All Food Articles—Don't Vote For Money Out of Your Pocket.

The effort of Mr. Meighen during the last ten days of the campaign has been centered on an attempt to convince the farmer on the advantages of high protection. Mr. Meighen has promised the farmer a high tariff on foodstuffs to eliminate competition.

Snow May Bring Big Vote; Especially In the Country Election Workers Believe

Experienced Campaigners Say Farmers Will Be Freed From Work in Fields To Ballot.

ONUS PUT ON CARS

Motor Fleets Will Redouble Effort To Get Vote Out in City Ridings.

"Well, this is certainly mean weather," remarked the affable stranger on the back of the street car.

"You said it, brother. It sure is Meighen weather."

"Wonder how it will affect the voting tomorrow?" rejoined his companion, thereby voicing a question which was uppermost in the minds of thousands of workers in all political parties throughout this part of the province when they awoke this morning to find that the weatherman had played an unpleasant election joke by sending anywhere from two to seven inches of snow all over the district.

Although at first glance prevailing weather conditions would seem to indicate a much smaller turnout at the polls tomorrow than would ordinarily be the case, especially in the country districts, many experienced campaigners are of the opinion that the voting will not be seriously affected.

Two factors will operate to overcome bad weather and had roads. One is that in practically every riding each party has a bigger and better organization of volunteer motor cars than ever before. The other is that on account of bad weather, farmers will be unable to do any work in the fields, and will be forced to take the time to get to the polls to vote.

May Increase Vote.

Dr. C. C. Ross, Liberal candidate in West Middlesex, who has had much experience as a campaigner in rural districts, was quite optimistic about the prospects this morning. On account of the impossibility of digging potatoes or doing any other field work, he thinks that the snowfall may even increase the vote, instead of decreasing it.

"The party with the best volunteer organization of cars will have the advantage in tomorrow's polling in London," was the way Major W. H. King summed up the situation at local headquarters. "We are in good shape as regards cars, but we could still use a few more, and would like to hear from further volunteers. We will put stress on our motor service."

London was treated to a blanket of about two inches of snow during last night, and although the weather was not particularly cold—the temperature did not drop below 30, according to the local weather bureau—it would be rendered decidedly unpleasant. Despite good car organization the vote is bound to be affected to a certain extent by the inability of old people and convalescents to get to the polls. One worker reported this morning that he knew of at least three voters in his subdivision who would be unable to get out owing to the weather.

Fascisti Mark Entry Into Rome

Rome, Oct. 28.—The Fascisti throughout Italy today celebrated with more than their usual effervescence, the third anniversary of their march into Rome under the guidance of Mussolini. All the public buildings and most of the private ones were festooned with the national tricolor and Fascist emblem, while the banks and business houses were directed to close at noon in order that the festive spirit might be complete.

The principal mode of celebration was the parading and reviewing of the Fascist national militia in the various large cities.

BREWER TO TESTIFY AS WITNESS HERE

Will Be Brought Back From Kingston For Trial of W. McDonald.

Herbert G. Brewer, sentenced to two and one-half years in Kingston penitentiary on a charge of falsifying accounts in Bank of Montreal to the extent of over \$7,000, will be brought back from Kingston to testify for the crown against Wm. McDonald, 37, who is charged with conspiracy to defraud the Bank of Montreal of over \$7,000. The necessary order was signed by Judge Macdonald today. Crown-Attorney stated this afternoon.

McDonald, who was remanded for a week, was taken to the police court Thursday before Magistrate Graydon, will be remanded for a few days more when he appears tomorrow in order that the crown may have time to bring Brewer from Kingston.

McDonald was on parole from Kingston when arrested by the police on his return from the United States.

NOT ONE QUEBEC SEAT CONCEDED TORIES

Liberal Leaders on Eve of Polling Confident of Solid King Support.

LETHBRIDGE COUPLE ARE FOUND DEAD IN MOTOR CAR

Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Robinson Were Returning From Visit to Ailsa Craig.

Lethbridge, Alta., Oct. 28.—Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Robinson, of Lethbridge, who were found asphyxiated in a closed car south of Great Falls, Mont., on Tuesday, left this city a month ago to visit Mr. Robinson's parents at Ailsa Craig, Ont. They were returning through the United States by motor; their car stalled in the mud south of Great Falls, near Spionkop, and they were found dead in the car with the door locked and the engine running. An inquest is being held at Stanford.

PLANE CARRYING AUTO IS DAMAGED IN CRASH

Providence, R. I., Oct. 28.—The large commercial airplane, Miss Essex, conveying an automobile to Boston, was considerably damaged and its six occupants, including the pilot, Lieut. George H. Pond, shaken when it was forced to land in a field in Seekonk, Mass., near here, late yesterday afternoon.

SEVENTEEN-YEAR-OLD GIRL MOTHER SLAYS COMPANION

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 28.—Helen Schmitz, 17, last night shot and killed Edward Lister, 33, as the pair returned from a motor car ride. The girl, who said her action was prompted by Lister's refusal to marry her, then drove to the police station and gave herself up. She told the authorities that Lister was the father of her infant son.

TWO CARS WRECKED IN COUNTY

Wedding Trip of Essex Couple Almost Ends Disastrously in Collision.

SPORT CAR IS DITCHED

Americans Escape Serious Injury When Motor Skids and Turns Over.

A wedding trip almost miraculously escaped being shattered by tragedy at 10:15 this morning when a light coupe, in which Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Hyland of Essex were taking a honeymoon trip, was demolished as it crashed into the rear of a standing oil truck at Glendale on the Lambeth highway.

Fifteen minutes before the Hyland car mishap, a sport roadster, carrying two Americans, skidded on the highway and turned over into the ditch almost at the same spot. Neither of the occupants was injured, and after being taken to hospital by a passing motorist, they continued their journey by train to Toronto.

Mrs. Hyland received painful cuts about the face and a severe shaking up. Mr. Hyland was not badly hurt.

Doctor Soon on Spot.

Hurrying to Lambeth, Dr. E. McGillicuddy of London arrived at the Glendale curve within a minute after the crash. Rendering first aid, Dr. McGillicuddy brought the couple to London, where he attended to Mrs. Hyland's injuries.

Later in the morning, St. Thomas relatives took the couple to the Brompton hospital, where they left this morning en route to Toronto.

Dr. McGillicuddy asserted that Mr. and Mrs. Hyland's escape from death and serious injuries was remarkable. He said that he had never seen a car so badly smashed and injured, and injuries to the occupants so slight.

Pinned in Wreck.

Ross Hicks, who operates a gasoline station at Glendale, heard the crash and rushing to the oil truck saw the couple driven under the rear of the big tank. The occupants of the auto were pinned in the wreck, and it was with great difficulty that they were extricated.

While there were no actual witnesses to the accident, on the way to the hospital the couple skidded in turning the corner and before it recovered collided with the standing machine.

The front of the coupe was completely wrecked while the inclosure was splintered by the force of impact. The oil truck was not badly damaged.

KING CLOSES CAMPAIGN IN NEWMARKET TONIGHT

Opposition Leader Will Make His Final Appeal to Ottawa Audience.
