Aged But Sprightly Hams Push Tecs Farther Down

Take First of Series 5-1, When Haines Is Touched Up.

Johnny Carlin's aged yet sprightly Hams pushed the Tecs into the gloomier recesses of the cellar yesterday, taking the first set of the series 5-1, cackling in the manner of the very old as they tucked the victory away in their worn but bags, the echoes of which selfsame cackles is still ringing in Buzz Wetzel's ears.

W. Miller, who, besides having a different initial, does his hurling from the opposite side to the other Miller on the Hams' roster, opposed Hinky Haines, but at no time did this argument assume the proportions of a duel, for with the exceptions of the first, second and fifth frames, Hinky had a wary eye on trouble, waiting on some one of the bags, whereas W. Miller was singularly free from embarrassment of any kind until the 9th frame, when a rattling single by Schaefer right by his ankle and Churry's smash, which went clean through his waiting hands, had the visiting southpaw somewhat unpoised. Barbelon's choice killed off Churry at second, Schaefer going to third from whence he scored on McNamara's choice, which forced Barbelon at second. Gettle singled, but the rally fell flat on its face, when Mackey's batting for Haines stung one right at George Washington Stutz, the low comedian person at third, who put the ball in his pocket with one hand as he put his foot on the bag for the putout.

Haines' Tumbles Start. Hinky got through the first two frames, though men reached second and third in each, but in the third the Hams poured into the runways. W. Miller, unlike most pitchers, singling, Dollie Gray drawing the first of seven walks Haines was to issue during the afternoon, with Carlin hitting safely at short. At this painful juncture the impulsive Mr. Churry was overcome apparently by a wild desire to peg to second, which he did, and which was still wilder. W. Miller loping in with a runner, stopped talking long enough to lift a sacrifice fly to center, scoring Gray and Bill Kuhn drove a single out to center, which brought in Carlin.

With one gone in the fourth, Haines issued Oakes a pass, and the rabbit 'opped it home when Joe Briger, the young college recruit Johnny Carlin, sprang on the runner, and a double out near the sign boards. In the sixth, Oakes singled to center, and as McNamara groped around for the ball, Haines dashed for second, being thrown out, the second time the eager Hams were cut off this way by a runner. Hinky slipped back in through by walking Briger. W. Miller's grounder, which drew Boyko's single to the ball, stopped it, but nobody was on first to take the throw, and as a mere side issue by this time, out to center.

In the seventh, with outs in between, Haines walked three, but Oakes tapped down a weak force-out at second. It looked like still more runs in the eighth, when Briger singled to the ball, Miller's choice wild to second and everybody safe. Little Lessons In Golf BY CHESTER G. HORTON, Nationally Known Golf Instructor.

Many players ask me not only how to grip but where to grip the club. The grip my wooden clubs should be the middle of the leather, my steel, mid-iron, jigger and mashie at the top. My stopper is gripped in all three places, according to the distance to be made—at the top for full shots, at the middle for half shots, and at the lower end of the leather for quarter of muscular force.

In this picture we see S. Davidson Heron, former amateur champion, with an overlapping grip. It is essential in all shots that the hands and wrists work together, and doubly essential that they do so in putting, where the pendulum stroke must be obtained.

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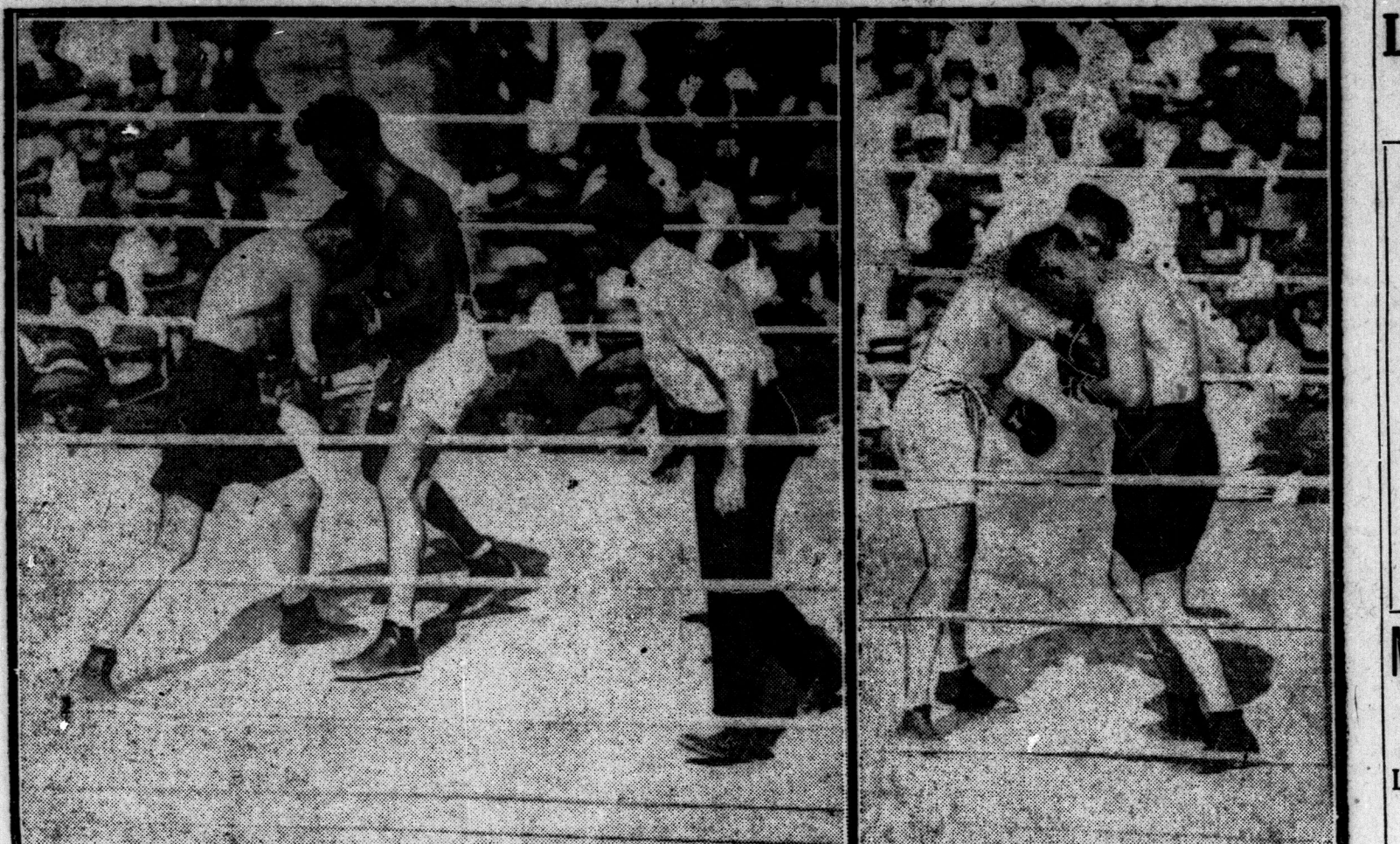
