


Little Lessons In Golf BY CHESTER G. HORTON, Nationally Known Golf

Many players ask me not only how to grip but where to grip the club. I grip my wooden clubs about the middle of the leather: my cleek, mid-iron, jigger and mashie at the top. My stoppum is gripped in all three places according to the distance to be made—at the top for full shots, at the middle for half shots, and at the



shots. Years of instruction have shown me that the first step in teaching was to unteach, so as to say, the habit of grabbing hold of the golf club as if it were a baseball bat, and making plain that golf is not a game of brute force. The player must manage to loosen his muscles in taking his grip. The grip, whatever the club, must be preliminary to a relaxation of the muscles of the body, so that the shot may be made with a rhythmic flow of muscular force.

In this picture we see S. Davidson Herron, former amateur champion, with an overlapping grip. It is essential in all shots that the hands and wrists work together, and doubly essential that they do so in putting, where the pendulum stroke must be obtained.


