The revenue of Canada for the past eleven months was \$46,571,284. At this rate the total for the year may reach \$50,000,000, which is a very large sum for a country of the population of the Dominion. During the first year of Confederation the total revenue from all sources was \$13,687,928. The increase has certainly been startling for thirty-three years. 
