CAMPBELLTON DOES WELL IN RECRUITS

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ANOTHER STEAMER SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Leeward Bound From London to Holland was Sunk by Gunfire

(Special to the Graphic)

London, March 18th.—The British steamer Leeward bound from London to Harlingen in Holland, has been torpedoed by the German submarine U-28, forty-two miles south east of the Mass. (Holland) light ship. The crew of seventeen were given five minutes to take to their small boats, which the submarine towed until a pilot boat was met. The men were then transferred to the pilot boat and landed at Hook of Holland. The Leeward was a cross channel steamer of 374 tons and was owned by the Steam Navigation Company of London.

Amsterdam, March 17th, via London.—The steamer Leeward was not torpedoed, but was sunk by gunfire from the submarine U-28, according to the Handelsblad (Hook of Holland) correspondent. The despatch also states that the steamer received a signal to stop by two shots fired from the submarine which had not been previously observed, the German craft hiding under the shelter of the Mass lightship.

London, March 18th.—Regiment of the Landstrum moved down by fire from French mitrailleuses. Germans make third unsuccessful attempt north of Arras to recover lost ground, and are equally unsuccessful in the region of Perthes, where the allies brilliantly maintain superior positions.

Paris, March 18th.—German tourists staying in the Italian Riviera have been privately notified by the authorities to leave Italian territory immediately.

Brussels, March 18th.—The firm of Henri Leten has been fined 20,000 marks (\$5,000) for violating the order prohibiting payments to creditors in England.

London, Mar. 18.—Denmark, Norway and Sweden have been denied identical representations to allied powers against Anglo-French policy of reprisals on German commerce.

Petrograd, Mar. 18.—Battering away at Austro-German line over battlefield 600 miles long, Russians are making progress in both Poland and Galicia.
