Biting The Finger Nails. Dr. Jerome Tuthill, of Chicago, in The Medical Record, says: A novel incident, reaulting from a habit of very common prevalence among nervous people, was brought to my notice recently. A young lady presented berself at my office complaining of a constant irritation in her throat. Two weeks previous-ly she had been taken with a severe "sore throat," which was treated by a neighboring physician. Under his care, she says, the inflammation quickly subsided, but there still remained a sensation of irritation. The patient then confessed to the habit of biting her finger nails, and, moreover could remember that a day or two previous to the onset of her throat trouble a piece of nail which she had bitten off had become lost in her mouth, but after it had caused a fit of coughing she had forgotten about it until reminded by my discovery.
