The wholesale trade at Toronto is fairly active, the orders of a sorting-up character being fairly numerous. The tone of the dry-goods and hardware markets is strongest, with advances in prices fully maintained. The outlook is considered promising, with stocks of merchandise in the country within bounds. Retail merchants continue to buy cautious, and are thus enabled the better to meet maturing obligations. Farmers continue to hold back their wheat, and this accounts for Toronto prices being 12c a bushel higher than Chicago. There was a fair crop of wheat in Ontario the past season, and the large Manitoba crop ought to dispel any fear that might exist as to Canada. importing wheat within the present cereal year. Coarse grains are also higher, partfcularly oats and peas. The hide market is in a demoralized condition, and prices are fast declining. Green hides are 1 cent lower than a week ago, the price now being 6c for No. 1. The depression in the trade at New York and Chicago is given as a reason for the weakness here.


