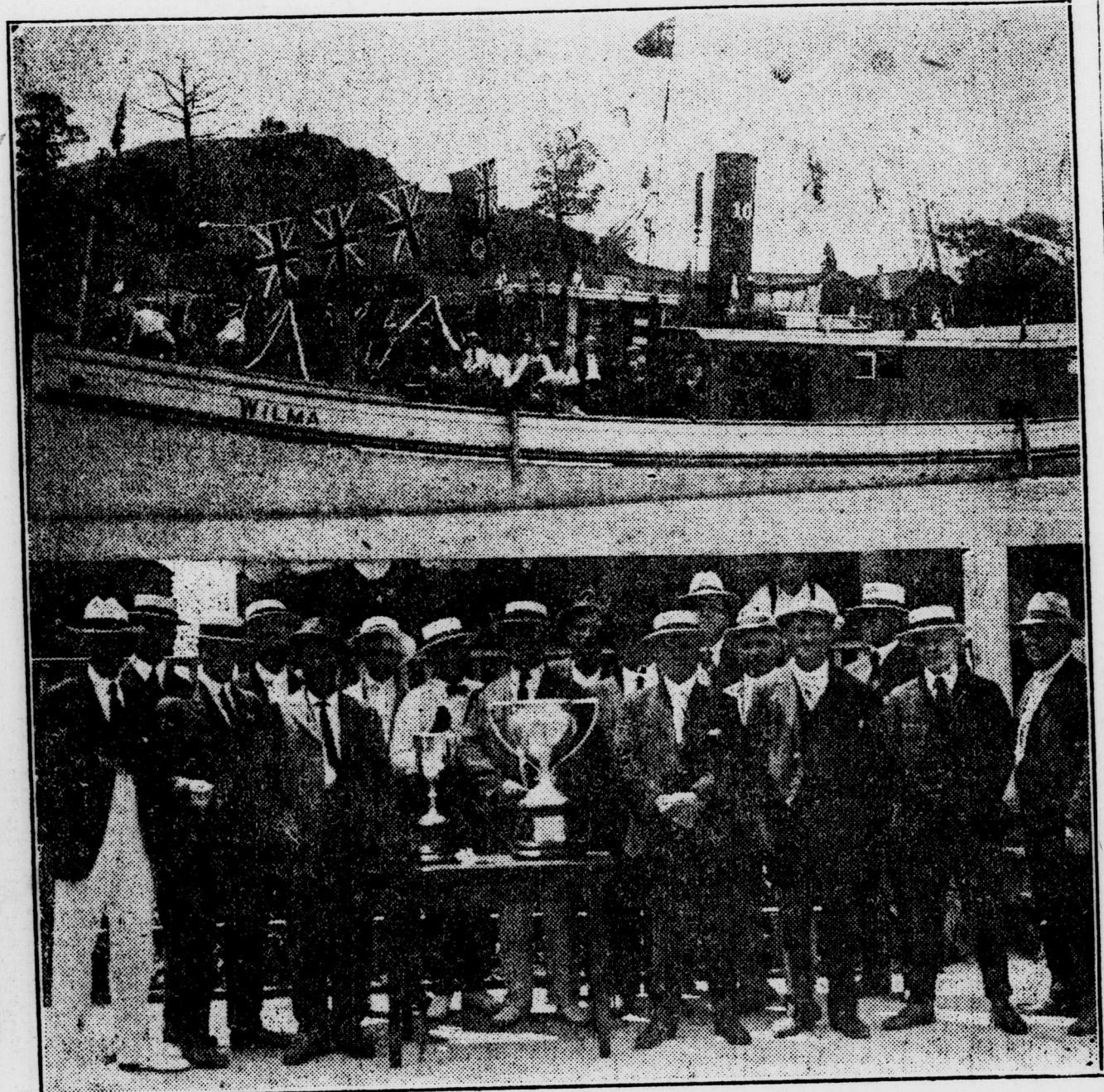

## RECORD HOLIDAY CROWD AT PORT

The work of the layers on the Morgan was pretty and many favorable comments were heard from the spectators. It took them nine minutes, 52 seconds to complete the laying.
